

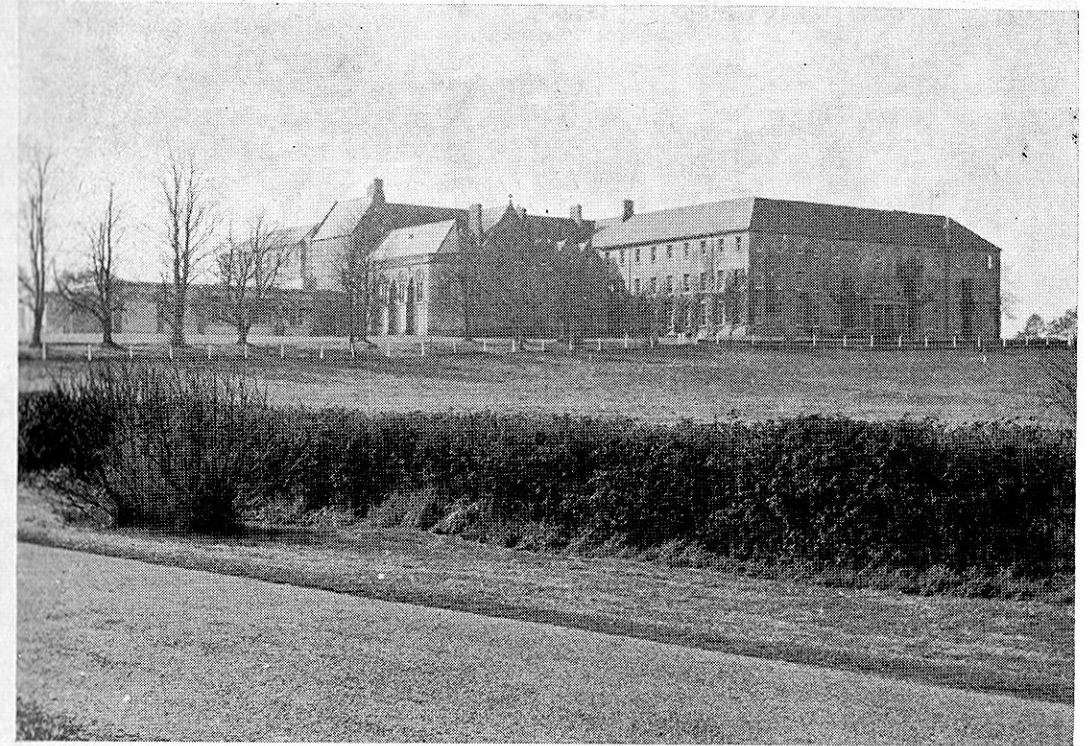

EDITORIAL

This *Mungret Annual* is a costly one; and not only in the sense that you have had to pay more for it than in previous years. It is the final *Mungret Annual* and as such it has cost a lot because it has been a heartbreak to produce. It is all the dearer for that! The *Annual* was first published, as you know, in 1897, fifteen years after the college re-opened under new direction—that of the Jesuit Fathers. Not that Mungret was an unheard of place before that date; actually there was the old monastery long before the foundations were set for the present building. That monastery dates from way back in history—perhaps as far back as the sixth century.

But the present site, as you can read later on in these pages, was first occupied in 1858 when an agricultural college opened there

under the auspices of the Commissioners of National Education. This enterprise failed and the college was closed down in 1877, in which year there were only six students. In 1880 it re-opened as a seminary for the Limerick diocese, with some places for lay boys. This was not a very successful venture either, and lasted but one year; Mungret closed again in 1881.

There was a Jesuit in Limerick at the time running an apostolic school—where boys are given preliminary training for the priesthood in mission countries. This school was housed in the Crescent in Limerick city. The accommodation there was too cramped, and the director was keeping an eye out for a more adequate site. For the school, however, Mungret would have been too costly—one of the main reasons why it had failed in its two

previous roles. But it was still a very interesting prospect. So Dr Butler, Bishop of Limerick, was approached and it was decided that the apostolic school and the Limerick diocesan seminary would join forces and finances and move out to Mungret. This came about in September 1882 and the director of the apostolic school became the first Jesuit Rector—Father William Ronan, S.J. (The seminary was to move out again in 1888 when St Munchin's was opened.)

That was ninety-two years ago this coming September. But now Mungret is closing its doors once again. It rose from its ashes twice before: will it do so again? That is a question which nobody can answer for certain. Perhaps it will, perhaps not. How relevant the question is could be debated. Accepting reality as we find it, we can only say that it is definitely closing for the third time in its 116 years. The reasons for the closure are many and intricate: one is the fact that Jesuits are fewer in number and are in ever greater demand for new apostolates. Another is lack of finance. The running of a college such as Mungret requires great financial commitment, resulting in very high school fees. These latter are not welcomed (need one say it?) by anybody... but we are not going to enter into this discussion any further.

In the present, and final, edition of the *Mungret Annual* an attempt has been made to focus on Mungret College itself. Thus, you will find a great number of photographs of the college; you will find a certain amount of its history, especially the early history of the Jesuit occupation of the school. You will find an account of many of the Jesuits who were—for longer or shorter periods of their lives—directly connected with Mungret; there is not just the usual "Roll Call" of the present academic year, but, thanks to the late Fr. J. Deevey, S.J. (R.I.P.), a complete Roll Call down through the years. Fr. Deevey brought this Roll Call up to 1963; it has been brought up to date by Messrs Fergus O'Donoghue, S.J., and John Redmond, N.S.J. Our sincere thanks go to them both.

This *Annual*, as well as being the final one, has to cover the past six years because, due

to circumstances beyond anybody's control it was not possible to publish an *Annual* since 1968. Thus, you will find photographs of many different people at very many different types of work and play. As you read or glance through the pages devoted to sport and other extra-curricular activities just pause and ask yourself "Does all this 'life' really come from the Mungret that is closing?" And, whatever generation you belong to, compare the present level of "life" with that of your day. You will probably agree that the level of the 1970s compares very favourably with, if it does not in fact outshine, that of your generation.

There are two disappointments which the Editor feels he must mention: the lack of any listing of the well-being and whereabouts of past pupils; and the lack of any information on the newly-ordained priests of the last six years. Such news has been a prominent feature of every *Annual* since the first in 1897; and even though we "dedicate" this final *Annual* to our *alma mater* itself, we would like to have included some small biographical or autobiographical notes on some of the past pupils. Unfortunately this did not materialise.

There are, however, three past pupils we just have to mention. Chronologically, Fr. William Stephenson, S.J., is the first of these. Fr. Stephenson was born in 1882, the very year the Jesuit Fathers took over the direction of Mungret. He came to Mungret in 1895 and spent three (according to himself) "very happy" years there. Those of you who have a copy of either *New Era*, Christmas 1969, or *The Mungret Eagle*, February 1970, will find there an outline of the school timetable of his time—and you will probably thank your lucky stars that you missed that regime! Fr. Stephenson is now ninety-two years of age and is still an active man, living in Rathfarnham Castle, Dublin 14. Needless to say he is heartbroken that the place he loved so well is closing. He was unable to bring himself to make his annual retreat in Mungret this year, as the emotional effort would have been too much for him. We would like to assure him that even though the college is closing—and that is a loss—he

will be remembered in the hearts of very many past Mungret men.

We would now like to offer our warmest congratulations to a man who has been called to the highest ecclesiastical dignity, apart from the papacy, any Mungret man could ever hope for. We speak of **Timothy Cardinal Manning**. Cardinal Manning was in Mungret from 1923 until 1927; he was ordained to the priesthood on 16 June 1934—forty years ago this year. In 1946 he was appointed Auxiliary Bishop of Los Angeles, and thus became one of the youngest bishops in the world. In 1968 he was appointed Bishop of Fresno, and a year later became Auxiliary Archbishop of Los Angeles. Last year he was made Cardinal. In offering him our congratulations and *ad multos annos*, we would ask him to remember, from time to time Mungret men the world over in his prayers and Masses.

Finally, we wish to offer our warm congratulations to **Dr. David Cremin** (1944-51), who was ordained Auxiliary Bishop of Sydney in January last. He has joined a long list of past Mungret men who have received this wonderful privilege and responsibility. In wishing him well and *ad multos annos*, we express our hope that the burden of the office may not be too taxing. May you, Bishop Cremin, have a most fruitful episcopate.

Time now for listing those to whom this *Annual*—and the Editor himself—is much indebted. There are so many people who

have been of invaluable assistance that to name them all would fill another few pages. But to the Jesuit community in Mungret, the domestic staff there and the boys of the college—I shall never forget you all. Fathers and Brothers, thank you for your patience, tolerance, and co-operation. My very warm thanks for your friendship and support. May you not be too disappointed with the final result. To Rhetoric and Syntax of this last year of 1974: many thanks for your friendship and welcoming smiles and other kindnesses. My only hope is that our friendship will continue and grow stronger.

Many thanks to all those who wrote articles, poems, historical notes which do *not* appear in the publication; also to those people who have given—some most generously—of their advice. It was all very much appreciated. To Mr. Niall O'Keeffe and Mr. Jack Kelly of Baggott Print Ltd., our block makers, thank you both very much. To Mr. Michael Kane of the Leinster Leader Ltd., our printers, many thanks. There is one other group which I must mention: it is the group of Jesuits with whom I live in the Basement. They have had to put up with my anxieties, worries, joys and excitements; I have been a burden of great weight to them in very many ways, and never a murmur from them. For their wonderful concern, their truly great support, they deserve much more than I can give. To Michael, David, David, David, Fergus, John and Paul—sincere thanks.

The Apostolic School

In the year 1850 a young priest of the diocese of Dromore in Co. Down, who had been ordained at Maynooth two years previously, was received as a novice into the Society of Jesus; his name was Fr. William Ronan. Four years later he went to the Crimea as chaplain to the British troops who were fighting there against the Russians, and as spiritual director to the Irish Sisters of Mercy who were working there as nurses.

When he returned to Ireland he was appointed to give missions and retreats throughout the country and he continued that work for seventeen years. During that period he met a great many boys and young men who would like to become priests but were prevented from taking any decisive steps because they lacked education and/or money. He felt very strongly that something should be done to enable such persons to try out their vocations.

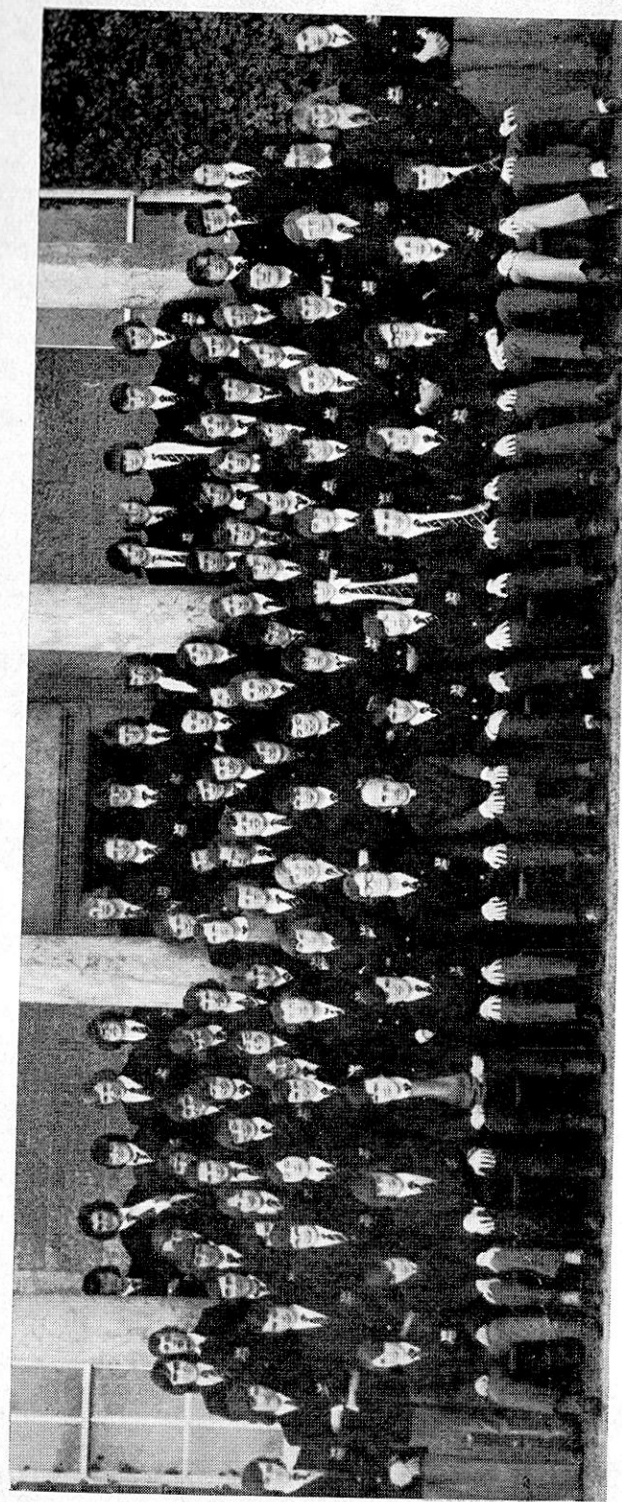
In 1872 he was made rector of our church and college in the Crescent, Limerick, and for ten years he held that post. He continued to think about unfulfilled vocations. He discovered that a fellow Jesuit in France had, in 1865, started a scheme for the founding of special colleges which would be sufficiently endowed by benefactors to enable them to supplement contributions from parents or candidates, and that some of these colleges already existed in France and Belgium under the name of apostolic schools. He set out to win support for this scheme in Ireland. He travelled up and down the country, speaking of the needs of the foreign missions and the number of Irish boys and young men who were only looking for the opportunity to become missionaries. Nearly everywhere bishops and priests and the laity gave him subscriptions and in 1880 he felt justified in renting a house in the Crescent, Limerick, for those he hoped to help.

He went to the Continent to visit these

colleges and to see if there was any prospect of getting an experienced man to take charge of a similar college in Limerick. He was warmly welcomed everywhere he went but there was no man available for the Limerick project. He had a great devotion to the Sacred Heart and he decided not to return to Ireland without visiting the Paray-le-Monial shrine where Our Lord had appeared to Blessed Margaret Mary, as she then was. He reached Paray in a very depressed and discouraged mood and he poured out all his troubles at the shrine. When he returned to the Jesuit house where he was staying he met a young French priest who was a member of the community and who had some knowledge of English. To his delight he found that this young man had been in charge of the apostolic school at Poitiers the previous year and that he would gladly go to Ireland if Fr. Ronan could secure the approval of his Provincial to do so. The priest's name was Fr. John Baptiste René, S.J. Fr. Ronan had a hard job to persuade the Provincial to give up a valuable man but in the end he succeeded and Fr. René was able to be in Limerick for the opening of the apostolic school in the Crescent on 24 September 1880. After what had happened it is not surprising that Fr. Ronan called it the apostolic school of the Sacred Heart.

They began with eight boys and by the end of the second year there were twenty-eight. They attended classes in the Crescent College. It was now obvious that a larger house would be needed.

Back in 1858 the Commissioners of Education had opened an agricultural college at Mungret. This was largely due to the influence of Thomas Spring Rice, Lord Mountcagle of Bandon, who, in addition to being Chancellor of the Exchequer in England, was a good Irish landlord. The college building was two storeyed. It contained what

were later to become the community quarters, two dormitories, the rooms on the ground floor underneath and the kitchen, plus the farm buildings in the yard behind the house. It was built to accommodate seventy to eighty students but for some reason it never had more than fourteen and at times there were only four. In 1877 it was decided to close the college.

It was rented by the Bishop of Limerick for his seminarians for the scholastic year 1880-81 and it then became vacant. Fr. Ronan had his eye on it, but he felt that it would not be an economic proposition to acquire the college with the as yet relatively small numbers. He succeeded in persuading the Bishop, Dr. Butler, to agree to sending the seminarians back to Mungret where they would be looked after by a Jesuit staff. He then secured a lease of the property. The apostolics took up residence on 10 August 1882 and they were joined by the seminarians on September 14 of that year. Fr. Ronan became the first rector and Fr. René continued to be in charge of the apostolics. They began with thirty-two apostolics and thirty-one seminarians. Fifteen of the seminarians were not clerical students. From the beginning each group had its own regime.

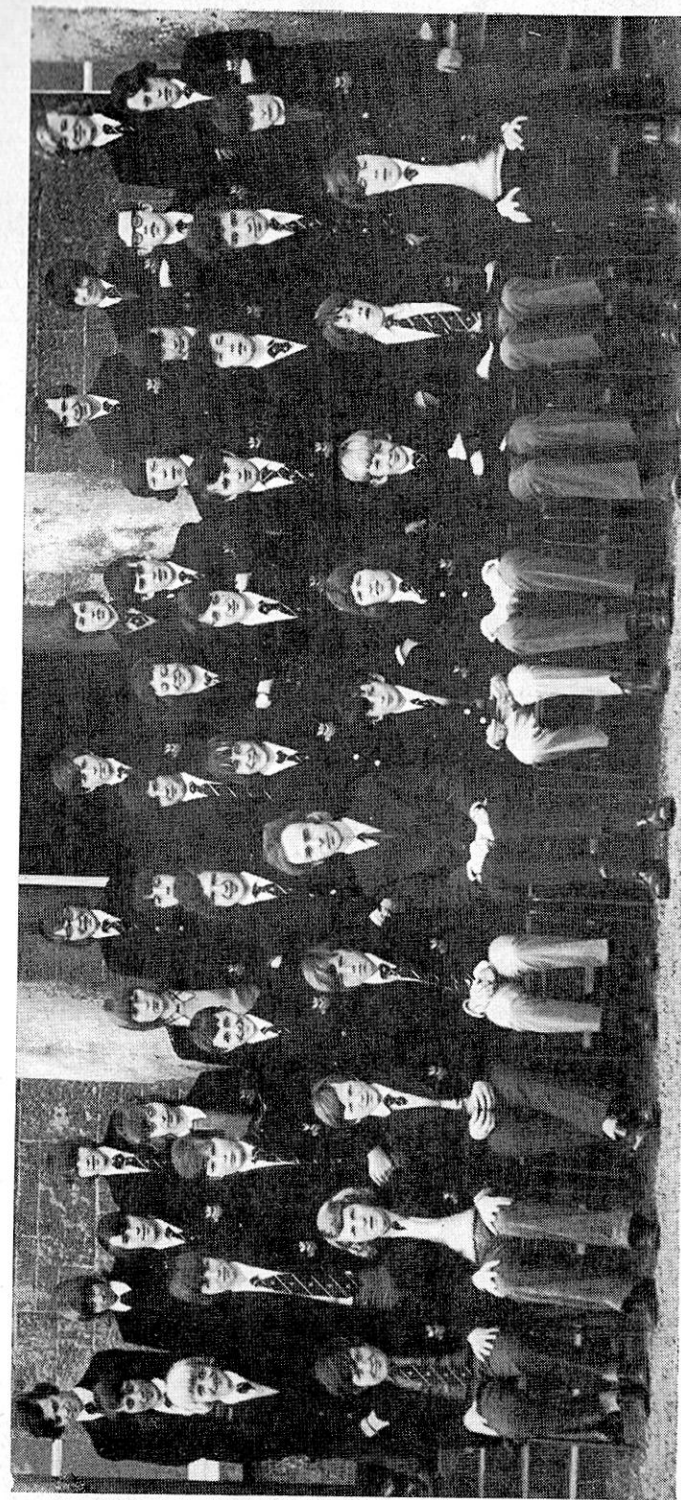
The number of applicants grew and very soon the buildings became inadequate; for some time the apostolics had to use the one room as a dormitory and study hall, and there was no chapel. The Bishop and Lord Emly were trustees of the estate of Lord Dunraven and he had left £2,000 to be used for Catholic purposes. They gave this to Fr. Ronan for the building of a chapel on condition that he would find the same amount for additions to the college buildings. This was followed by gifts from other people, and Fr. Ronan was able to arrange for the building of the chapel to begin in September 1884. Though he had no other money in hand he told the architect to site the chapel some distance from the only building then standing and to make plans for another building to join the two. No sooner were the final arrangements for the building of the chapel completed than he booked a passage to the United States with the intention of seeking

there the money that would be needed for the connecting building. He left Cobh on 21 September 1884. He was in his sixtieth year and a tired man but he travelled to nearly every part of the United States, begging for financial help wherever bishops and priests would allow him to do so. Naturally enough, he had a mixed reception. Some bishops and pastors gave him every facility but others could not see their way to do so.

He had intended to spend only one year in the United States, but found it necessary to spend two. Because of his prolonged absence Fr. René was appointed rector, and when Fr. Ronan returned he was put in charge of the apostolics. He now had enough money to set about putting up the building which was to connect the chapel with the original building and which was to house the apostolics. It was because so much of the money for this building had been provided by the bishops and priests and laity in the United States that so many students in the years to come were encouraged to offer themselves to work as priests in the United States.

Shortly after the beginnings in Mungret a new Bishop of Limerick decided that the seminarians should be housed in the city where they would be nearer the cathedral. This reduction in the number of students in Mungret was made up by accepting more lay boys; and in the course of time, as was natural, the number of lay boys considerably exceeded the number of apostolics.

One indication of the contribution of Mungret to the Church is that 702 apostolics and nearly 300 lay boys became priests. Of these one has become a Cardinal, His Eminence Timothy Cardinal Manning, the Archbishop of Los Angeles; two others became archbishops in Australia; and many more became bishops, of whom two are in South Africa, Dr. Hugh Boyle of Johannesburg, and Dr. Ernest Green of Port Elizabeth, who retired recently and is now in charge of an African parish. The most recent appointment has been that of Dr. David Cremin who has been consecrated Auxiliary Bishop of Sydney. To both Cardinal Manning and Dr. Cremin we heartily wish God's every blessing and a very sincere *ad multos annos*.

The Jesuit Community of Mungret

College 1882-1974

The prime mover in the establishment of Mungret College was Fr. William Ronan who became Rector of Crescent College, Limerick, in 1872. It was during his Rectorship there that he studied the possibility of founding an apostolic school for the education of boys who should later study for the priesthood and serve the Church in the missions overseas. By 1880 he was able to realise his ambition, but in a small way only. He secured a house adjoining Crescent College and made it the living quarters of his first batch of apostolic students who attended classes at the college. It was a modest undertaking but a brave one when we recall that poverty and hunger oppressed the country especially in the late 1870s.

At the end of two years Fr. Ronan's venture was succeeding, so much so that other premises more extensive than the dwelling house in the Crescent were already an urgent need. His thoughts turned to the buildings of the now defunct agricultural school at Mungret recently used for a very brief period as the seminary of Limerick diocese. But he had not the resources to purchase Mungret outright for a school which would be dependent for its existence on burses yet to be founded for the support of the apostolic students. In the event Fr. Ronan did not need to dismiss as a pipe dream his idea of securing the buildings at Mungret for a home for his students. It was a French secular priest, the Abbé l'Héritier, chaplain to Lord Emly, who suggested to Fr. Ronan a solution of the difficulty: the property at Mungret could be acquired by the Jesuits provided that education for lay-boys and instruction in agriculture could be assured in the new dispensation. So long as these conditions—the terms under which the Mungret Agricultural School had been endowed—were agreed to, there would be no objection to housing the

apostolic school under the same roof. The whole project was now placed before the Bishop of Limerick, Dr. Butler, who not only blessed it but gave it the supreme proof of his approval by entrusting his own seminarians to the new college. In this connection it may be recalled that Crescent College, founded in 1859, had served for many years as the diocesan seminary of Limerick. In more recent times, a priest of the Limerick diocese had attempted to give the diocesan seminary a separate existence of its own and for a brief period had conducted the seminary at Mungret but his efforts had ended in failure. Thus Mungret College at the outset of its existence in the Autumn of 1882 was in fact reassuming the role of Crescent College at the inauguration of the latter twenty-three years before.

The new Jesuit community of Mungret took up residence at their college on 14 September 1882. The Jesuits of foundation year were: Fr. William Ronan who had been still rector at the Crescent until his appointment to the new rectorship of Mungret on June 1; Fr. Charles McKenna (1836-1910), formerly a secular priest, sometime professor at Milltown Park, and now minister; Fr. William Sutton (1847-1922), a keen Shakespearean scholar and protagonist of the Baconian theory; Fr. Maurice Wolfe and Fr. Thomas Head, teaching staff; Fr. Patrick Hughes, bursar; Père Jean Baptiste René, superior of the apostolic school, and assisted by a scholastic, M. Joseph De Maistre; the Abbé l'Héritier, lecturer in physics and in chemistry.

Jean Baptiste René (1841-1916), a member of the Paris province, had already experience in directing an apostolic school at Poitiers. Fr. Ronan succeeded in persuading the Provincial of Paris to loan Père René to Ireland and René in fact became the first

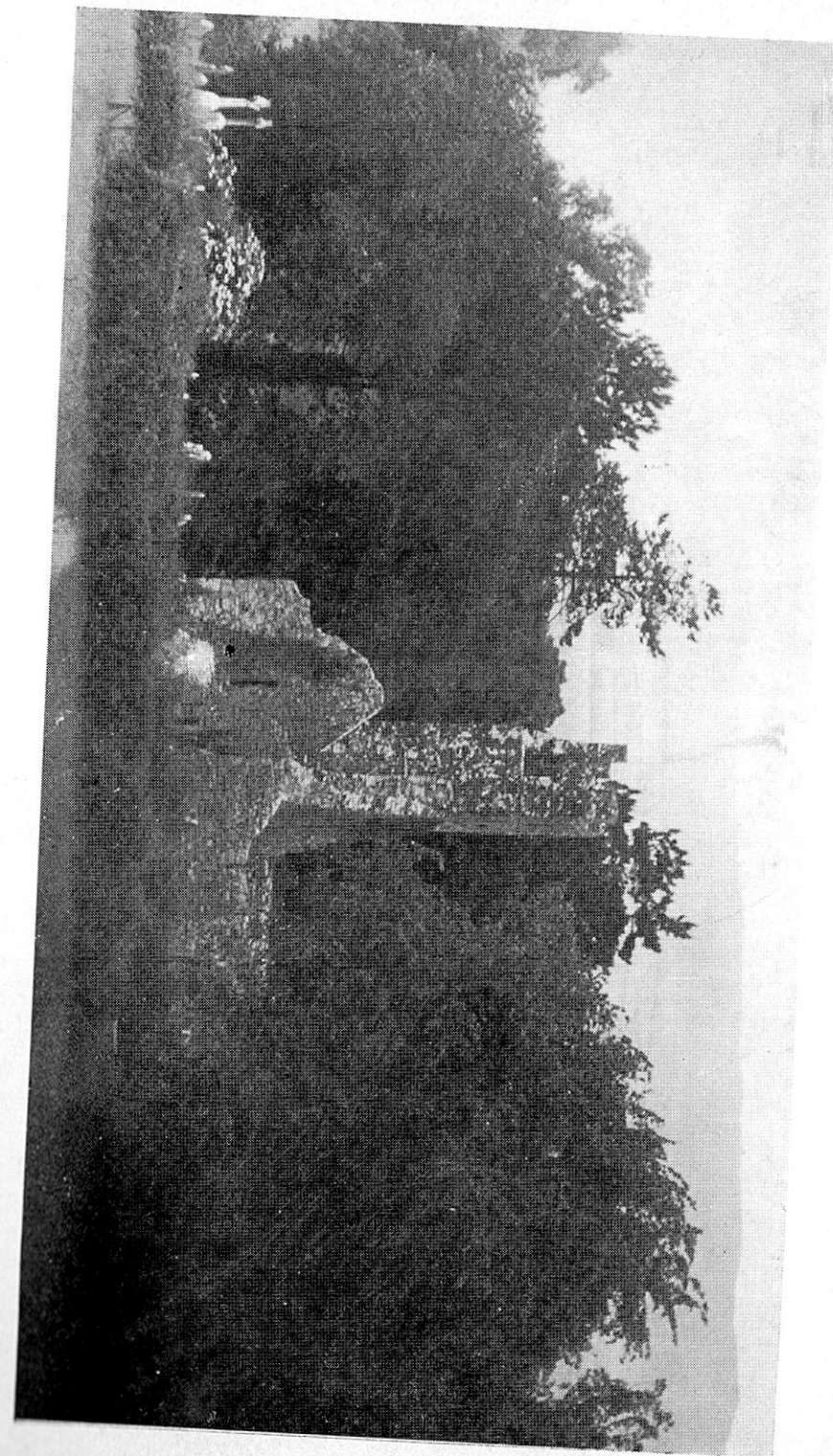


superior of the apostolic school at the Crescent in 1880. He was now joined out in Mungret by a young fellow countryman M. Joseph De Maistre (1861-1931) who was a great-grandson of Comte Joseph De Maistre (1753-1821), the great writer and philosopher. This young Joseph had renounced his right to title and estate in order to become a Jesuit. His appointment to Mungret was to a great extent for reasons of health but in the event his sojourn at Limerick proved beneficial. He was to die in Paris just a year before the golden jubilee of Mungret College. We shall meet the Abbé l'Héritier again. For the present it is enough to say that his association with Mungret was destined to last almost a quarter of a century.

The presence of Fr. Maurice Wolfe on the staff in foundation year was an indication that Fr. Ronan was faced with the problem of recruiting a community from a very sparse Irish province. Fr. Wolfe (1840-1905), a native of Finuge, Co. Kerry, was a member of the Lyons province. He was destined for mission work in America but Fr. Ronan was able to secure his services for Mungret for the next year or so. Indeed for the first six years of the college's existence a quite considerable number of the members of the community were French: Pères Eugène Carré, Octave de Bénazé, Joseph Rousseau, Jean Aubier, Jacques Daniel and the scholastics Felix Perrin, Sylvain Allenou, Marc Barthélemy. But a name to be specially noted in foundation year was that of Fr. Thomas Head (1842-1916). Thomas Head, one of the first pupils of Crescent College, after ecclesiastical studies at Rome and Carlow was ordained for Limerick diocese and served as curate in various parishes until he entered the Society at Milltown Park in 1879, just three years before Mungret opened its doors as a Jesuit school. From 1882 onwards until his death all his years, except when he became rector in Limerick and for a single year as member of the staff there, were passed in Mungret. His was to be one of the long associations with the college which past alumni on their return from overseas found so reassuring a link with the past. We will take farewell of Fr. Head later.

After three years in office as rector, Fr. Ronan was replaced by Fr. René. Fr. Ronan was released from the burden of the rectorship to enable him to collect funds in America in order to pay for the new college buildings and to establish bursars for the apostolic school. It can be left to our own imagination to visualise the difficulties the community laboured under during these opening years. The stone, the mortar, the wood, the iron, the slates for the rising buildings had all to be drawn by horse and cart for motor traction was not to be visualised for another three decades. Fr. René took up the rectorship on 31 July 1885 and for the next three years during which he remained in office his community was composed as follows: 1885-86, five Frenchmen and three Irishmen; 1886-87, five Frenchmen and two Irishmen; 1887-88, two Frenchmen and five Irishmen. The Abbé l'Héritier, who lived at Tervoe, did not form part of the community. Yet from the very start of Mungret College, students were prepared for the Arts degree of the Royal University of Ireland and it would seem that the Frenchmen had to take their good share of the classes which were being groomed for the university examinations. In view, it may be added, of the shortage of manpower in the Irish province, the new college proved to be a pioneer in "do-it-yourself" techniques. The few Fathers and scholastics had enough to do in the university department or in the important matriculation class so the conduct of the lower classes was entrusted to senior apostolics already engaged in their own university studies. Modern educationists would certainly decry such a system and condemn it roundly as approximating to a cramming establishment. Let the point be conceded. It should be explained, however, that one of the Fathers, Philip Brady, was a pianist of ability who taught pianoforte with success. Not all education critics can boast themselves of such an accomplishment.

On 31 July 1888 Fr. Thomas Head succeeded in the rectorship of the college while the outgoing rector, Fr. René, with his two countrymen Pères Daniel and Aubier, returned to France. We may salute the French



presence at Mungret during the previous six years by recalling here an extract from the speech of Lord Emly at the conferring of degrees at Earlsfort Terrace, Dublin, in the Autumn of that year: "A new college that I happen to take a particular interest in has been founded at Mungret ... and is I believe, the only Catholic college outside Dublin which confines itself altogether to university education. It has magnificent buildings, ample lecture halls, and one of the most beautiful chapels, I think, in Ireland. At our last examination the distinguished success of its students showed how admirable its teaching must be."

That same Autumn, the new Bishop of Limerick, Edward Thomas O'Dwyer, an alumnus of Crescent College, founded a seminary of his own in Limerick and withdrew his diocesan students from Mungret. The community at Mungret was now for the first time completely Irish: Fathers Thomas Head, rector; Richard O'Reilly, minister; Fathers Charles McKenna, William Sutton, Patrick Kane and Philip Brady. Two scholastics of uncommon ability were also incorporated on the teaching staff. These were Thomas Taaffe (1862-1913) who later proved to be a theologian of eminent attainments and Patrick Dinneen (1860-19) the future lexicographer. At this period of his life Dinneen's intellectual interests seem to have been directed towards mathematics. It would be fair to conclude that Dinneen found for the first time a great future for his native language some years later at the foundation of Connradh na Gaeilge.

The departure of the diocesan students from Mungret at the opening of the term 1888-89 may well be advanced as the reason why four Jesuit scholastics joined the community not in a teaching but a learning capacity. These were Messrs Edward Masterson, Francis Keogh, Francis Ryan and Patrick Barret. Their assignment was the third year of philosophy and, presumably, the final Arts examination of 1889. As the event proved, they were the only Jesuit scholastics ever appointed to study at Mungret. Of the four, only Edward Masterson and Patrick Barret ever came back to teach at the

college. Fathers Francis Ryan and Francis Keogh were to pass their priestly life in Australia where many a Mungret alumnus was to labour and die.

Before the end of the first decade of Mungret College the Provincial was able to spare four Brothers to help in the material running of the house. In 1889 these were Brothers Christopher Coffey, William McCartney, Thomas Carter and James Dempsey. Br. McCartney's association was brief but the other three, particularly Brothers Coffey and Dempsey, were to be long known to Mungret alumni returning from the four quarters of the earth.

We have already made some acquaintance with the greater number of the Jesuits who composed, successively, the Mungret community in the first decade. The school and the house of philosophy (the university section) were succeeding and no doubt the community enjoyed some of the fame and the golden opinions that favoured their successful pupils. Not everyone who knew of Mungret, however, entertained the highest esteem for the hard-working Jesuit schoolmasters and lecturers. As it happened, an educational endowments commission had been set up and the Mungret endowment came up for investigation. It is not our business here to go into the ins and outs of the Mungret endowment. It is enough to say that public funds set aside for the former Mungret Agricultural School with a small annuity for educational purposes had been made over to Mungret College under the Jesuit dispensation as the best means of utilising public money which would otherwise be wasted in the deterioration of disused buildings, etc. The Jesuits' occupancy of Mungret was admittedly good in law but this did not satisfy a few outspoken ascendancy men, particularly Anthony Traill, a future Provost of Trinity College, Dublin. Traill, as a member of the Educational Endowments Commission and with some acquaintance with the Mungret endowment, darkly referred to "a valuable piece of public property left in the possession of an illegal body of men who had been turned out of almost every Roman Catholic country in Europe. Many of these

at the time were French refugees."

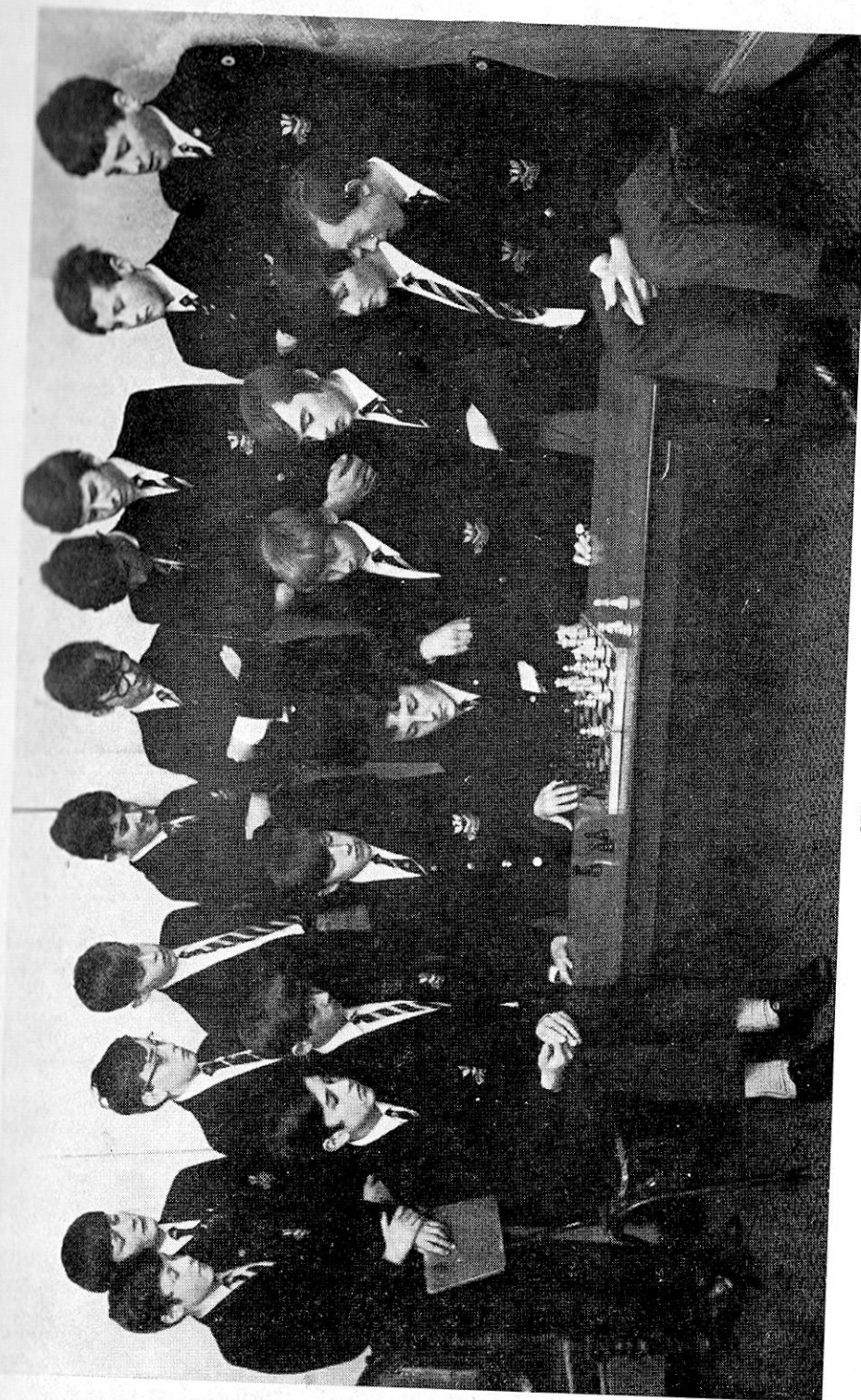
It is unlikely that the Jesuit community of Mungret or of any other of the Irish province's houses for that matter were unduly perturbed by hearing themselves referred to as an "illegal body of men". That Traill and a few bigots like him could speak the way they did only proved that ascendancy was not quite extinct. It would take nearly another decade, down to 1898, to silence ascendancy when the Local Government Act swept away Grand Juries and other survivals of unenlightened times into the Limbo of forgotten things and made democracy really workable for the first time in the country's history.

On 2 July 1891 Fr. Vincent Byrne was appointed rector of the college in succession to Fr. Head. The 1890s brought new names and faces to the Mungret community, one of whom is specially worthy of remembrance. This was Fr. Michael Browne (1853-1933), a native of Limerick, who was prefect of studies and lecturer in the university department from 1891 to 1895. Most of his life, however, was to be spent as master of novices or spiritual director of scholastics of the Irish province. As a retreat director and confessor he was much sought after by communities of various religious congregations. And though the memory of his life and work may have become dimmed with the passing of the years, except for those of an older generation, it can be safely said that his name will never be forgotten completely for it will always be recalled that he was master of novices and first Jesuit spiritual guide of Fr. John Sullivan, the cause of whose beatification is at present before the Holy See. (A fine biography of Fr. Michael Browne from the able pen of Fr. Thomas Hurley (still happily with us) appeared some twenty-five years ago.)

From the lists of the Mungret community of the 1890s outstanding names were those of Fr. Edward Cahill and Mr. Lambert McKenna, a scholastic of outstanding brilliance. At the time of his regency, Mr. McKenna was devoted to the teaching of Ancient Classics but when he would later return as a priest to Mungret he was pre-

paring to be a lexicographer of Irish. Unfortunately for Mungret Fr. McKenna's periods of teaching there would amount in all to only six years. But no future history of Mungret College can justly omit a large chapter of the life and work of Edward Cahill.

The rectorship of Fr. Vincent Byrne witnessed a consolidation of the work for the college so ably effected by his predecessors, Fathers Ronan, René and Head. And the folklore of the Irish province held that Fr. Byrne, proud of his able community and successful college, jealously upheld the good name and dignity of both. In illustration of this it was said that the mother college, of the Crescent, Limerick, had once to make atonement for an affront offered the rector and community of Mungret. The folklore maintained some such story as this. Crescent College having staged a play at the old Theatre Royal in Limerick, very properly sent an invitation to the rector of Mungret and his community to be present at one of the performances. The play was running successfully and there was much demand for tickets of admission. Alas, on the evening when Fr. Byrne and some of his subjects arrived at the theatre, important persons were already seated in the places that should have been reserved for the Mungret Jesuits. There was some confusion at the discovery and someone lost his head, for Fr. Rector of Mungret College and members of his community were offered instead some places in the "gods". It is a matter for dispute whether the Mungret Fathers took the places offered or turned on their heels. But, a letter was dropped into the Crescent that night demanding that the rector come out next day to apologise to the Mungret community. Transport for the rector—the customary side-car of the period—would bring him out to Mungret. The following day the rector of the Crescent arrived by the side-car and was brought into the community room to meet Fr. Byrne and his subjects. An apology was offered and accepted. Some excuse was then tendered to the rector of the Crescent that no one could accompany him to the door. When he arrived there the side-car had already returned to Limerick. It was said this

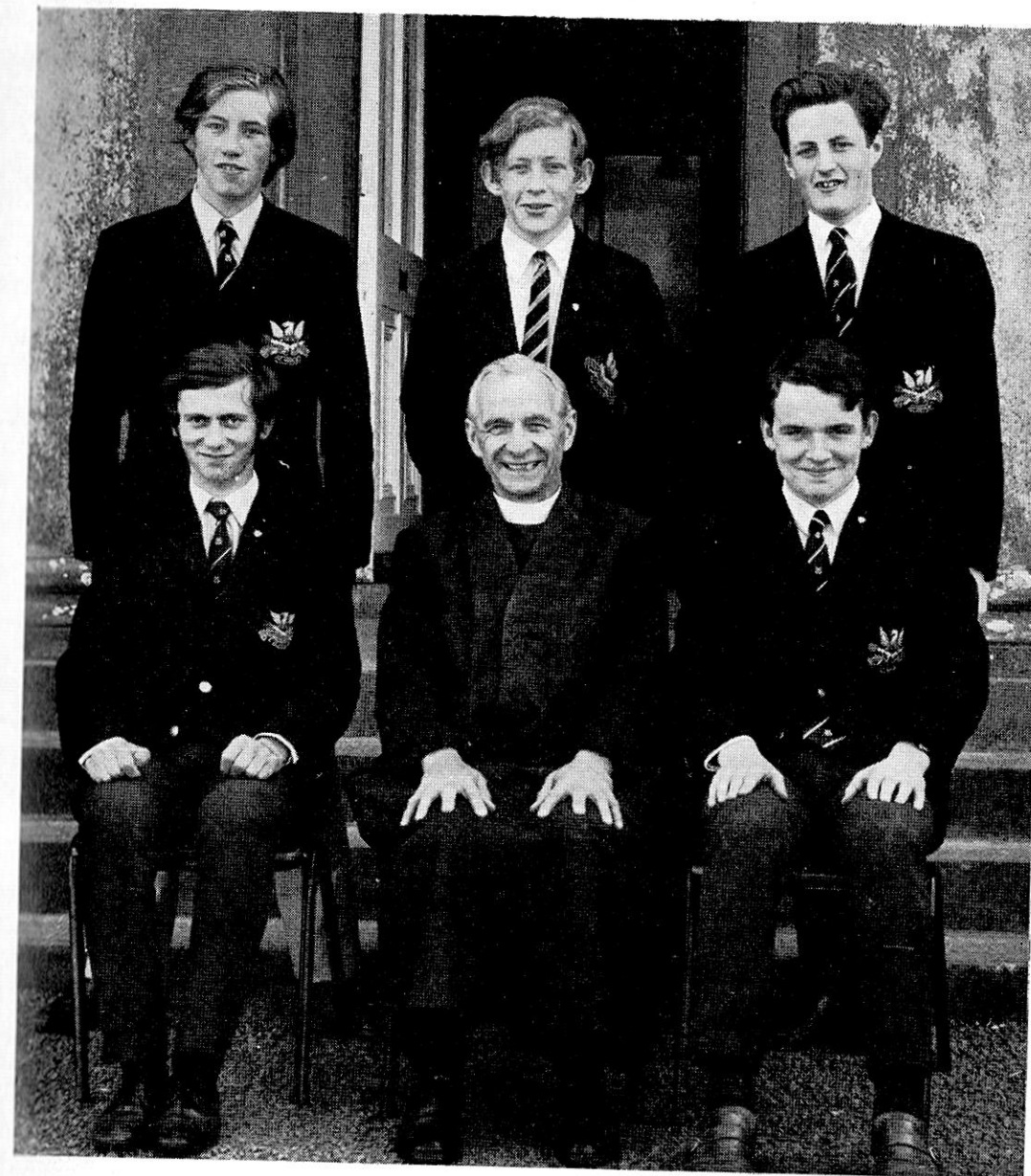
was purposely done that the apologising rector might have time for fuller reflection and purpose of amendment on the long walk back to the city.

The closing century added two distinguished names to the Mungret community. Once again, however, the names flash meteorlike and are gone but for all that should be recalled here. John MacErlean (1870-1950) and Patrick Connolly, the latter an old Mungret man, were both to achieve renown in the Irish province and in Ireland for that matter. MacErlean, a Belfastman and Irish enthusiast, was to become historiographer of the Irish province. His knowledge of Irish history was profound—an accomplished linguist and so able to reach historical sources outside the grasp of those who lacked these work tools—his opinions were much sought after by learned men. He corresponded with the Bollandists. Though his stay at Mungret was brief, Fr. MacErlean did not quite forget his sojourn in Limerick as for some years after he contributed articles to the *Mungret Annual* and everything he contributed to its pages was distinguished. Patrick Connolly (1875-1951) was to take over the editorship of *Studies* at the time of the outbreak of the 1914 war and conducted that review with remarkable success up until a few months of his death.

Fr. William Henry (1859-1928) was appointed rector on 31 July 1900 and held office for three years. He was a native of Derry. While those who knew him claimed that he was really a kind-hearted man it could not be denied that his austere countenance disconcerted people and on top of all he was regarded by many as a mystery man. A ghost story, much repeated before the television age, was the common property of community, boys and the district. Fr. Henry was rector of Mungret at the time of the story. According to the tradition, a member of the Mungret community died and his funeral took place to the old community cemetery (closed to burials since 1945). But the funeral was not the end of the deceased Jesuit upon this earth. Workmen returning to their homes in the evening were convinced that they saw the dead Jesuit on the "Black

Walk" and soon the story spread. At length it reached Fr. Henry's ears. He went out to the Black Walk that night. Next morning, which was a feastday on which either white or red Mass vestments would have been used, he told the priests of the community to use black vestments and offer a Mass each for the dead. Later that same day at the end of one of the community functions he warned all present that the rule of offering suffrages for the dead should always be scrupulously observed. The tradition is that Fr. Henry refused to be drawn by the question whether he had experienced anything unusual on the night of his visit to the Black Walk. With the passing of the years, the story became distorted. A newer version mentioned Fr. Thomas Head as the deceased Jesuit who haunted the Black Walk. It is not hard to dispose of this later accretion to the original story, for Fr. Head did not die until some thirteen years after Fr. Henry had relinquished office! And the world was a more sophisticated place by late 1916 with a great European war on and the Rising in Dublin only a few months over. It may be said here that the only dead Jesuit who could have fitted the part of nocturnal visitor to the Black Walk was Fr. Charles Walshe who died on 20 October 1901. No other priest of the Mungret community died during Fr. Henry's rectorship. The *Mungret Annual* of that year carried a sympathetically worded obituary of Fr. Walshe.

On the departure of Fr. William Henry, Fr. William Sutton succeeded in the government of the college on 4 August 1903 not as rector but as vice-rector. In all probability he was reluctant to accept the responsibility of office but he remained as vice-rector until the appointment of Fr. Thomas Vincent Nolan on 9 October 1905. It was during Fr. Nolan's rectorship that Mungret celebrated its silver jubilee. A feature of this jubilee year was a special jubilee number of the *Mungret Annual* in addition to the 1907 regular number published at the beginning of the year. In the years immediately preceding the silver jubilee Jesuits who joined the Mungret community were Fr. William Kane, Mr. John Casey, Fr. John Gwynn,

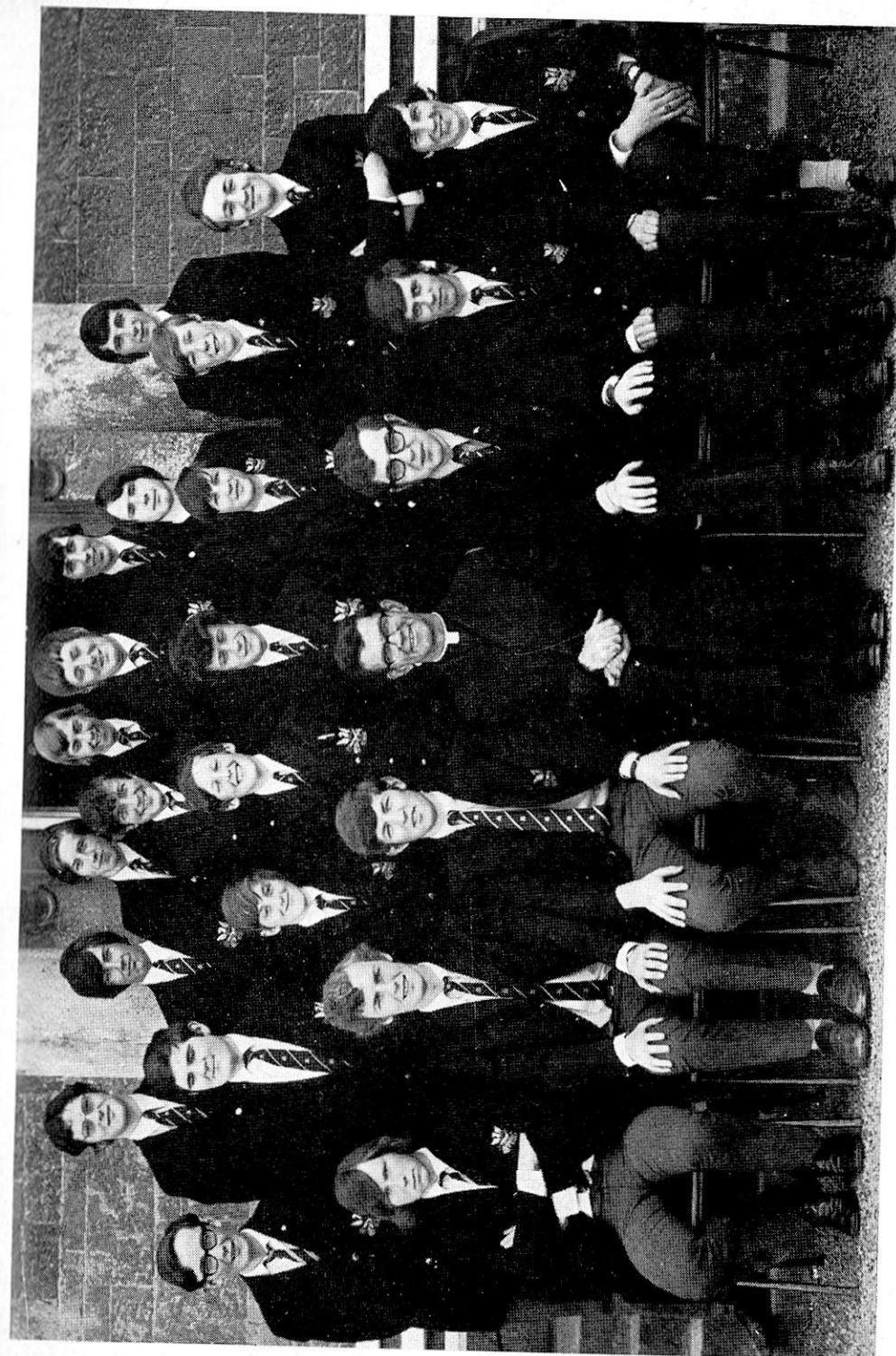

Fr. Patrick Power (prefect of studies) and Messrs Edward Dillon, James Finucane, Patrick Gannon and Joseph Flynn. Patrick Gannon was afterwards a noted theologian and pulpit orator while Joseph Flynn became widely known throughout Ireland as the Director of the Pioneer Total Abstinence movement. With only two very brief absences from Limerick Fr. William Kane was to become a legendary figure in Mungret until his death in the 1940s. And Fr. John Casey, though not so long associated with Mungret as was Fr. Kane, had a long and fruitful career at Mungret whether as teacher or prefect of studies. Fr. William O'Leary arrived in Mungret in 1905 and spent ten years at the college. He was a mathematician of considerable attainments and in the year following the silver jubilee established a seismological observatory which was in a fair way to putting Mungret on the map but for the fact that his talents were required for the Jesuit house of studies at Rathfarnham. His later career was passed in Australia, where he died, 16 April 1939, at Sydney.

Jubilee year was memorable also as the year of Fr. Ronan's death. Born at Newry, Co. Down, 1825, William Ronan studied at Maynooth where he was ordained priest for Dromore diocese, 1848. Received into the Society he made his noviceship in France, 1850-52, and later served as a military chaplain in the Crimean War. Back once more in Ireland he worked as a missionary for many years and became rector of Crescent College, Limerick, 1872-82. At the Crescent he founded the apostolic school and as we have seen became first rector of Mungret College in the foundation year. The development of Mungret College and the solid financial provision for the apostolic school were to a large extent due to Fr. Ronan's tours in America where he interested the hierarchy and laity in his great undertaking. On his return from America, he resumed the direction of the apostolic school but in 1887 took up once again the work of preaching missions, and eventually became superior at Gardiner St., Dublin. By 1901 his active working years were over and he was sent back to Mungret where he served up to the end as spiritual

father to the community and the schools. Contemporary obituary notices gave due recognition to the ability and effectiveness of Fr. Ronan but his name is once more recalled here for it travelled with his beloved apostolic students to the ends of the earth.

If silver jubilee year did not mark the end of an era for Mungret—it certainly proclaimed the college's coming of age—the year 1908 certainly beckoned a new dispensation for its pupils and students. A University Bill was before the British Parliament and the Mungret community with good reason keenly followed the proceedings. For the educational system at Mungret from its foundation had been geared to preparing its students for the examinations up to the degree of B.A. in the Royal University. It was hoped that the new university arrangements would take into account Mungret's fine showing over the previous quarter of a century and that the college would be allowed as hitherto to present its students for university examinations. It is a matter of history that the National University set up by the Act of 1908 provided for three university colleges only, Dublin, Cork and Galway, and that students desiring to graduate in the university should have to attend lectures in some one of the three colleges designated. (St. Patrick's, Maynooth, was recognised but not made a constituent college of the new university.) But it can be recalled here that the change of the university department at Mungret was gradual: Mungret students were allowed to present themselves for the B.A. degree of the new National University until the Summer of 1912. This arrangement had been arrived at in order to accommodate students who had matriculated in the now extinct Royal University. Thereafter, what had been the university department of Mungret College, i.e. the First Arts, Second Arts and B.A. classes, became henceforth the Mungret School of Philosophy for ecclesiastical students only. While the university department existed, lay students could and did present themselves for the Arts course up to and including the B.A. degree. It is not our purpose here to trace the story of the school of philosophy. It is enough to say that

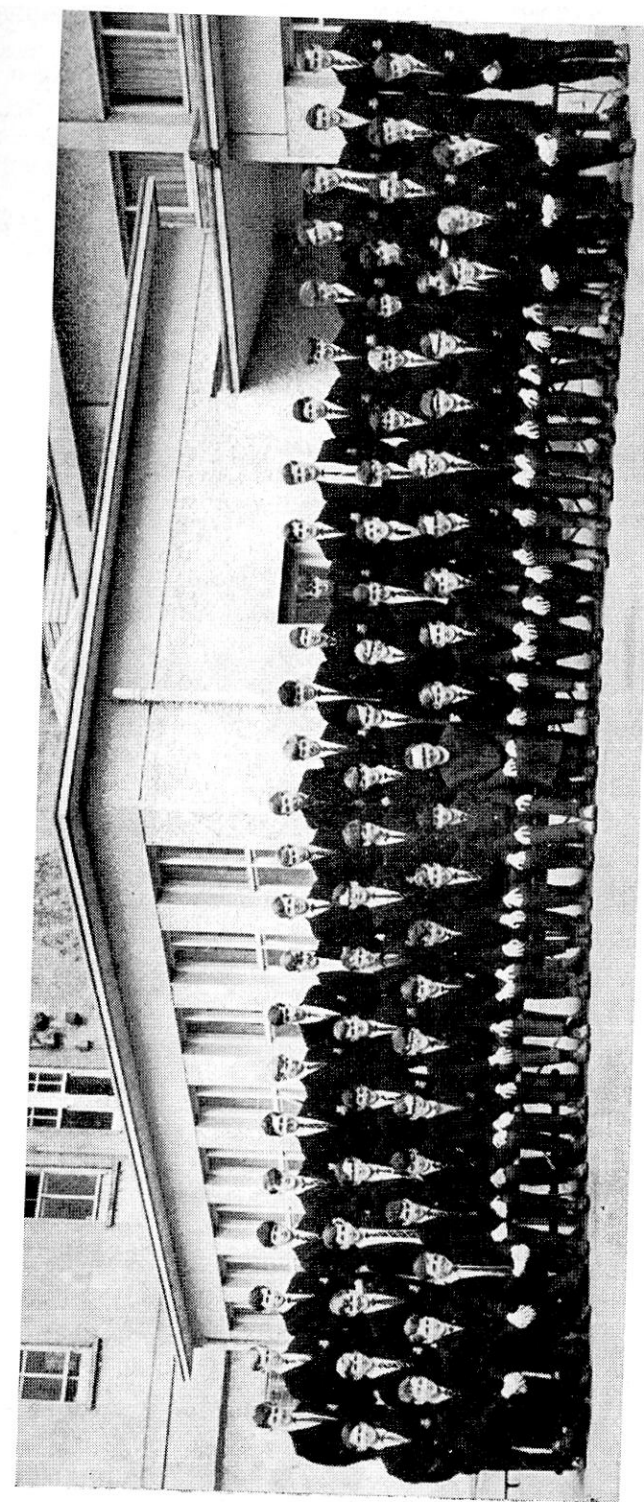
the disappearance of the university department happily did not bring about any lowering of academic standards and that alumni of the school of philosophy after 1912 maintained the best traditions of the earlier years. Mungret alumni entering on their theology studies in Rome, or Ireland or the United States or Australia continued as heretofore to be assured of a welcome from their professors and the respect of their fellow students.

The rectorship of Fr. Thomas V. Nolan came to an end in 1908 when he was appointed rector of Clongowes. During his period of office he added an extra storey to the original college building—not a very artistic addition, brick and concrete facing over limestone—for extra accommodation was needed for the growing number of pupils and their Jesuit masters. He was succeeded by Fr. Tomkin who held office until 1912. Fr. Tomkin in turn was transferred to Clongowes in succession to Fr. Nolan who was appointed Provincial. Fr. Tomkin was a capable administrator with a sense of fun. He was ready for an argument equally with small boys or members of his community. Woe betide his opponent who jumped rashly to a conclusion. In time most people got used to sharpening their wits in readiness for Fr. Tomkin, who loved nothing so much as a bloodless intellectual victory. Stories, real or invented, of his argumentative prowess, were endless. It was said that while he was rector of Mungret a benefactor of Mungret at his death left the college the right to collect a debt from Clongowes Wood College. Fr. Tomkin, it would seem, represented successfully to the General of the Society that Clongowes should pay up. Not long after, when Clongowes had discharged its debt, Fr. Tomkin was transferred from Mungret to Clongowes as rector. He would now like to have had the same sum of money which had been paid over to Mungret at his disposal for some new developments at Clongowes! So he opened up with the General of the Society a correspondence in which he emphasised that undue influence had been exercised by a previous rector of Mungret (it was in fact himself) in the recovery of an alleged debt!

His successor at Mungret, Fr. Patrick Tighe, remained in office for only nine months as his health was apparently unequal to his responsibilities. He was later appointed to the Australian mission where he died in 1920.

During the last years of the university department at the college, the Jesuit staff included Fathers Joseph Tunney (1856-1923), a former professor of theology, Patrick Bartley (1879-1941), later professor of scripture at Milltown Park, and Patrick O'Mara (1875-1969), who was to be one of the Irish province's best-known missionaries and Fr. O'Mara's booklets for the devotion of the Holy Hour were to have a wide circulation both at home and abroad.

Fr. Edward Cahill had already given many years of devoted service to Mungret College when he was appointed rector on 13 July 1913. For the previous nine years he was superior of the apostolic school but his interests ranged over all the activities of Mungret and the prospects were good for a long and fruitful period of office. A year later, however, war was declared in Europe and soon the war was to spill over even beyond the confines of the Continent. In happier times Fr. Cahill might have succeeded in developing agriculture as a really lasting and characteristic feature of the studies undertaken at Mungret for he was a keen sociologist long before that expression enjoyed its present-day currency. He looked forward to the time when the farming community of the country would be a class thoroughly educated and enlightened in their calling. He was an early and ardent admirer of the doctrines of *Sinn Féin*. If ever he had chosen a personal coat-of-arms his motto would certainly have been something like "Creideamh agus Tír". He belonged to the very tiny political minority of Irishmen in 1914 who in the late Autumn of that year felt that John Redmond's policy had had its day. He regretted the split in the Irish Volunteers but made up his mind that it was not the larger following of Redmond now known as the National Volunteers but the much smaller parent body the Irish Volunteers that rightly claimed his allegiance. It was an open secret that he facilitated the Irish

Volunteers for their periods of training. At the time they could scarcely be described as a popular body in Limerick which still remained strongly Redmondite. But Mungret was out of the way and men at drill there would be less likely to attract attention than in a place in or nearer the city. It was an open secret also that his term of office was not extended for another three years not that his own political views were condemned by higher authorities but that any political views at all should be aired by any priest holding public office in the Society.

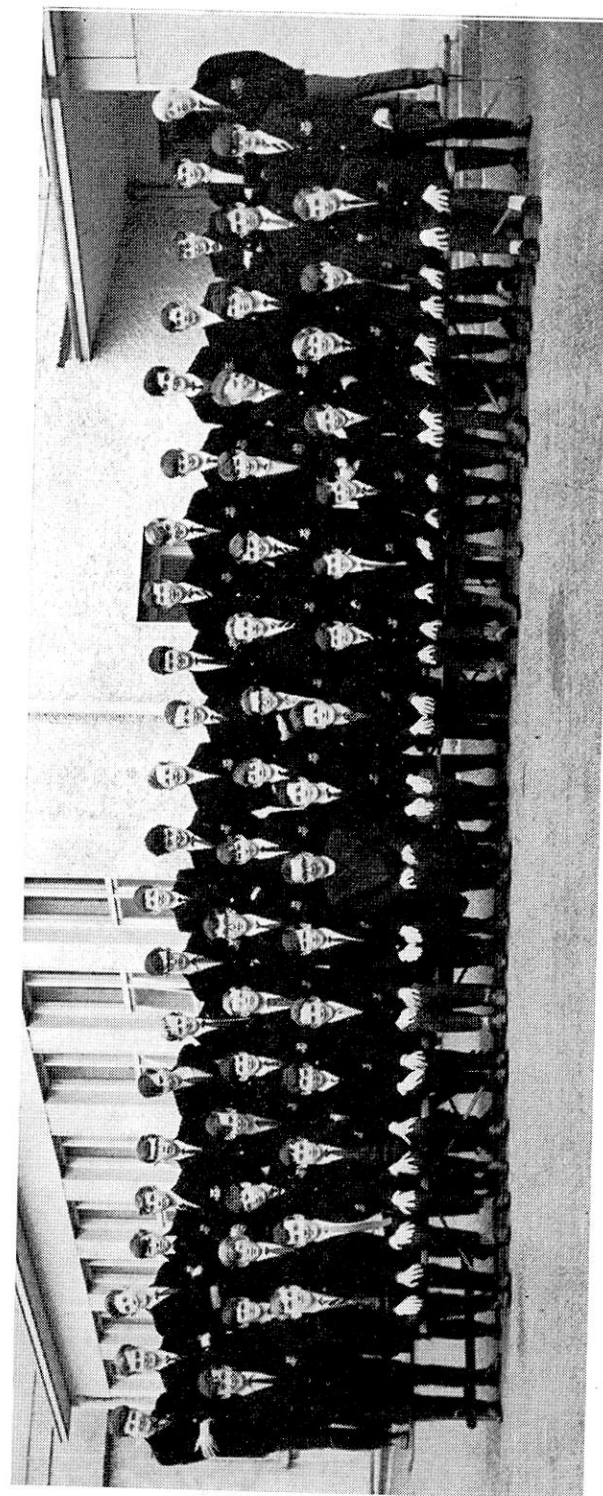
It is not without interest to recall here that Fr. Cahill was not the only member of the Mungret community to hold advanced (for that time) political views. At least three members of the Jesuit teaching staff were well known as holding the same political sympathies. These were Fr. William Byrne (1868-1943), Fr. John Casey (1873-1954) and Fr. Bart Coghlan (1873-1954). In the Summer of 1916 Fr. Cahill was transferred to Galway and Fr. Byrne to Tullabeg. Fathers Casey and Coghlan remained on at Mungret for another two years and were then transferred: Fr. Coghlan to Galway where he would spend the rest of his life, and Fr. Casey to Tullabeg whence he would later return to teach for some years again in his old alma mater. It is a commonplace of modern Irish history that what was considered advanced thinking in politics in early 1916 was the generally accepted view a couple of years later but it required courage to hold the less popular view before the executions, following the 1916 rising, lost the more moderate nationalist movement the popular sympathy. For this reason we can remember with pride Fathers Cahill, Byrne, Casey and Coghlan. They were good Irishmen and, their fellow-religious would concede, exemplary Jesuits.

The war years brought change into the lives of no small number of the Irish Jesuits amongst whom were to be found priests who had served Mungret at one time or other whether as prefects or masters. These were the Jesuits who volunteered for service as chaplains to the Catholic soldiers a very great number of whom were either Irish or of Irish descent. Fr. Patrick Tighe (at Mun-

gret 1897-1900 and later rector, 1912-13) on his way to Australia served for a time in a military hospital in Egypt. Fr. Patrick Barrett (Mungret, 1888-89 and 1899-1902) for reasons of age was not sent overseas but served in camp in England. Younger priests were sent overseas: Fr. Henry Potter (Mungret, 1894-97), Fr. William Gwynn (Mungret, 1894-97), Fr. Joseph Flinn (Mungret, 1905-06), Fr. John MacSheahan (Mungret, 1909-10), Fr. James Magan (Mungret, 1906-09), and Fr. Patrick O'Mara (Mungret, 1910-13). All the last-mentioned served in France but Fr. Jerome O'Mahony (Mungret, 1895-1900 and 1904-11) served out in Palestine. After the war years Fr. O'Mahony was to be known by many a past Mungret man during his years at University Hall, Hatch Street, Dublin. With the exception of Fr. William Gwynn who was back in Mungret, teaching, 1920-22, none of these chaplains ever returned to the college. One of them, Fr. James Magan, set out for Australia when the war was over. It was said that he returned from the front with advanced nationalistic views and that on his trip to Australia some military officers tried to have him arrested for seditious utterances. In Australia he found scope for his zeal and energy and died, as he wished it, in harness.

Fr. James Corboy was appointed vice-rector in succession to Fr. Cahill and a year later was confirmed in office as rector. His tenure was to be brief and he was obliged for reasons of health to relinquish the rectorship in 1920. A native of Grange, County Limerick, he was only forty-two years of age when he died in Dublin on 27 June 1922.

Here we might well give a summary account of the succession of the rectors after Fr. Corboy's untimely departure. Over the next dozen years there were to be exactly five incumbents—a rather rapid succession: Fr. John Fahy, 23 July 1920; Fr. John Joy, February 1922 until July; Fr. George Roche, 29 July 1922; Fr. Laurence Kieran, 31 July 1927; Fr. Edward Dillon, 13 May 1931. Fr. Fahy (1874-1958) had spent his early years as a priest at Belvedere where he eventually became rector. After his term of office he was appointed moderator of the apostolic

school at Mungret in 1919 and the following year rector of the college. His organising abilities were already well known in the Irish province but unfortunately for Mungret he was appointed Provincial on 25 February 1922. He was to hold that high office until 1931 when he was appointed Provincial of the new vice-province of Australia. The rest of his career was passed in that country. He died at Adelaide in 1958.

To fill the vacancy in the rectorship caused by Fr. Fahy's appointment as Provincial, the prefect of studies, Fr. John Joy, was appointed rector. The following July, however, Fr. Joy was appointed rector of Clongowes. Once again, we can indulge the daydream of what might have been the fortunes of Mungret if Fr. Joy had spent a long term of office at the college. He was young, dynamic and a man of vision. After a successful rectorship at Clongowes ill-health dogged him for many years until his death in Dublin in 1950.

Fr. George Roche's rectorship of five years was a break with the pattern of the rectorship at Mungret ever since 1882. He might well have completed six years in office but for the fact that Fr. Joy's health was beginning to cause anxiety and so Fr. Roche was sent as rector to Clongowes. Fr. Laurence Kieran's rectorship of four years was likewise terminated by his appointment as Provincial on 2 March 1931. Something like stability in the tenure of the rectorship was re-established in the appointment of Fr. Edward Dillon who was to continue in office until 1936.

Over the two decades preceding the golden jubilee of the college to be commemorated in 1932 there had been many appointments to the Mungret community but few of them could be described as of a permanent kind. Some names, however, came to be intimately associated during that period with the college and older readers will recall Fathers Ernest Spillane, Freddie Cuffe, Austin O'Kelly, Charles Mulcahy, William McCormack and Fr. Thomas Shuley.

Fr. Spillane (1875-1937), a native of Limerick city, joined the teaching staff in 1912 and with the exception of one year at

Belvedere College, served Mungret whether as master or minister of the house down to 1925. He was a gifted musician. His later years were spent as minister or spiritual father at Tullabeg and Emo.

Fr. Freddie Cuffe (1887-1951), a Dubliner, was at Mungret as a scholastic, 1916-18, and after his ordination was sub-moderator of the apostolic school from 1923 to 1933. He was an enthusiastic supporter of Irish and things Irish. After his years at Mungret he was on the teaching staff of Clongowes until 1943. His later years were spent as spiritual father to the Emo community.

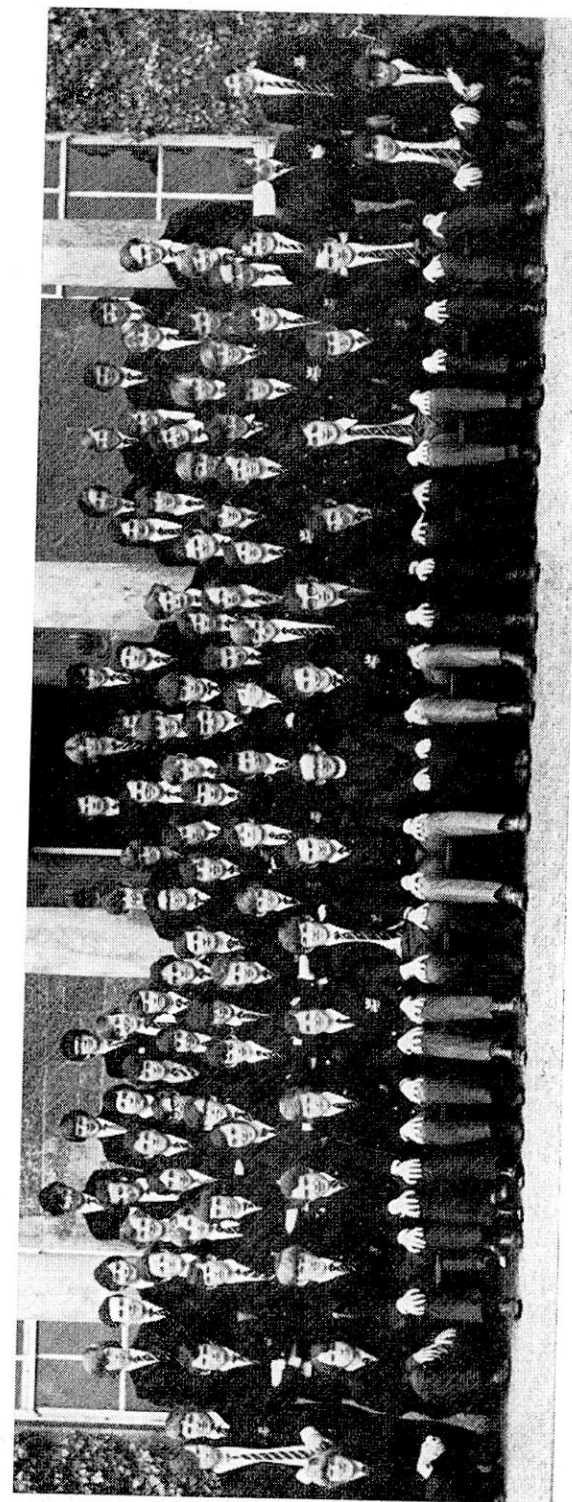
Fr. Austin O'Kelly (1876-1950), a Dubliner, and member of an old family prominent in the era of O'Connell, was on the teaching staff at Mungret in the years 1903-06, 1909-17, 1919-21 and again from 1922-23. In his later career he served in church work in England and later at St. Francis Xavier's, Dublin.

Fr. Charles Mulcahy (1874-1954), a native of Ardfinnan, Tipperary, spent only a few years, 1922-26, at Mungret yet it can be said that wherever he worked in the Irish province he displayed to advantage his many gifts: he was a gifted musician, a fine classical scholar and an able teacher of French. He was also a pioneer student of Irish. The greater part of his teaching career was spent at Clongowes.

Fr. William McCormack (1863-1931), a native of Cork, served many years whether as prefect or master at Mungret: 1889-91 as a scholastic and after his ordination 1907-14, 1923-30. He died in Dublin on 26 September 1931.

Fr. Thomas Shuley (1884-1965), a Dubliner, was prefect and later minister of the house from 1925-32. He was deservedly popular as a community man and also amongst the pupils. He was many years a member of the mission staff, served as minister at the Crescent and, in his later years, at St. Ignatius's, Lower Leeson St., Dublin.

We may well express the hope that the future historian of Mungret College will reserve a chapter to the Jesuit Brothers who employed their energy, their hearts and their hands in the service of the college. On the

present occasion, where space is limited, we have chosen for mention only those who spent ten years and upwards as members of the Mungret community.

Br. James Dempsey (1832-1904), a native of Clane, Co. Kildare, was at Mungret from 1888 to 1901. He was by trade a shoemaker and in those now far-off days when Mungret was a self-sufficient community, plied his trade for the pupils and his Jesuit brethren. His name is not in the early lists of the *Mungret Annual*. Lists of the Brothers were, apparently, not deemed necessary (!) until 1905-06. Br. James spent his last years in the noviceship at Tullabeg.

Br. Thomas Carter (1837-1909), a native of Ballinasloe, arrived in Mungret a year before Br. Dempsey but left Mungret also in 1901. He occupied a post that is long obsolete in boarding schools—he was in charge of the boys' wardrobe, that is, he had care of the magazine where the pupils' spare clothes were stored and saw to it that repairs were carried out by the tailor or the seamstress. He was also refectorian. He also spent his last years at Tullabeg.

Br. Christopher Coffey (1830-1911), a native of Trim, was at Mungret 1886-95; 1900-04; 1906-11. His obituary in the *Mungret Annual* recorded that he had a good knowledge of building and carpentry: "During the half century he spent in the Society he resided in nearly all the houses of the Irish province, wherever a trusty man was needed to take charge of a rising edifice or to see some important structural change safely through." He died at Mungret on 29 March 1911 and was buried in the old community cemetery.

Br. Patrick Rickaby (1861-1916), a native of Blackrock, Co. Dublin, was at Mungret from 1901 to the time of his death, 2 January 1916. He succeeded Br. Dempsey as shoemaker but this was, apparently his secondary occupation as in the days before a nurse took up permanent residence at the college, Br. Rickaby exercised the post of infirmarian.

Br. John Purcell (1858-1931), a native of Gorey, spent many years at Mungret, whether as dispenser or in charge of the domestic staff. He was at Mungret from

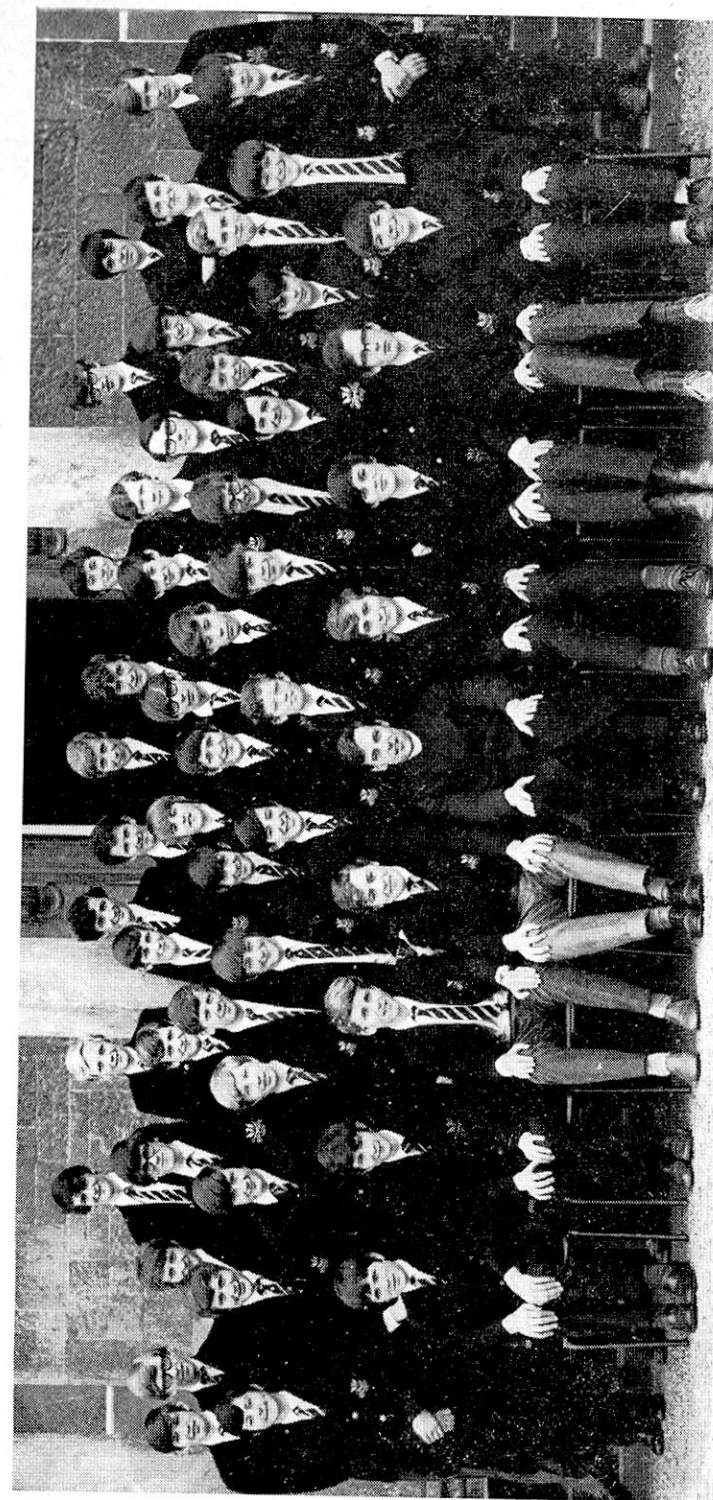
1901 to 1918 and again from 1924 to 1930. In this latter year he retired from active life to Tullabeg where he died on 1 June 1931.

Br. Thomas Casey (1865-1934), a native of Dublin, spent the greater part of his religious life—1916 until his death—at Mungret where he was a willing and cheery *factotum*. He died at St. John's Hospital on 10 September 1934 and was laid to rest in the old community cemetery.

Br. James McCabe (1882-1945), also a native of Dublin, spent the years 1911-22 at Mungret where he had charge of the dynamo (pre-E.S.B. days) and filled other posts in the house. He died in Dublin on 8 September 1945.

Br. James McDonnell (1878-1948), native of Bohola near Swinford, was here from 1922 to 1924 and again from 1930 to 1938, in charge of the domestic staff and superintending the refectories. He died in Dublin on 15 September 1948.

Br. Thomas Murphy (1894-1968), came to Mungret in 1920 and was to spend the rest of his life in devoted service of the college. His was a record amongst the Brothers for length of years as a member of the community. He was a resourceful mechanic and in pre-E.S.B. days was able to ensure unfailing lighting for the community and schools. He could also readily turn his hand to replacing a slate or pointing a chimney and it was often remarked with some amusement that his tours of inspection of the roofs were undertaken in times of strong gales when it was extremely dangerous to climb up to the rooftops. It was often said of him on such occasions that his guardian angel had to work overtime. He was accompanied on his rounds by a small black cur dog which showed a marked distance towards friendly passersby. Br. Thomas never liked to hear unfavourable comment about his dog. Whenever on a particularly stormy day he decided to climb up to the tallest roof for the purposes of inspection, his small dog would regard his master mount the long ladders and then move further back from the wall to keep his master still in sight. Woe betide the careless passerby who got in the way of the disagreeable little animal's vision. Br. Mur-

phy was one of the best-known and best-loved Jesuits who ever lived and worked at Mungret. Old boys, whether priests or laymen, from all parts of the world wrote to Br. Tom or called on him during return visits to Ireland. And when he died on 2 October 1968 his funeral was said to be the largest of any Jesuit funeral that ever entered the college cemetery.

For a brief period in the 1920s, 1923-26, Fr. Patrick McCurtin (1865-1938) was the superior of the apostolic school. He had been many years on the mission in Australia. On his departure from Mungret he was next appointed rector at the Crescent. On the establishment of the vice-province of Australia he volunteered to return there. He died at Melbourne, 16 July 1938. His successor as superior in the apostolic school was Fr. Jeremiah Kelly whose career is noticed later.

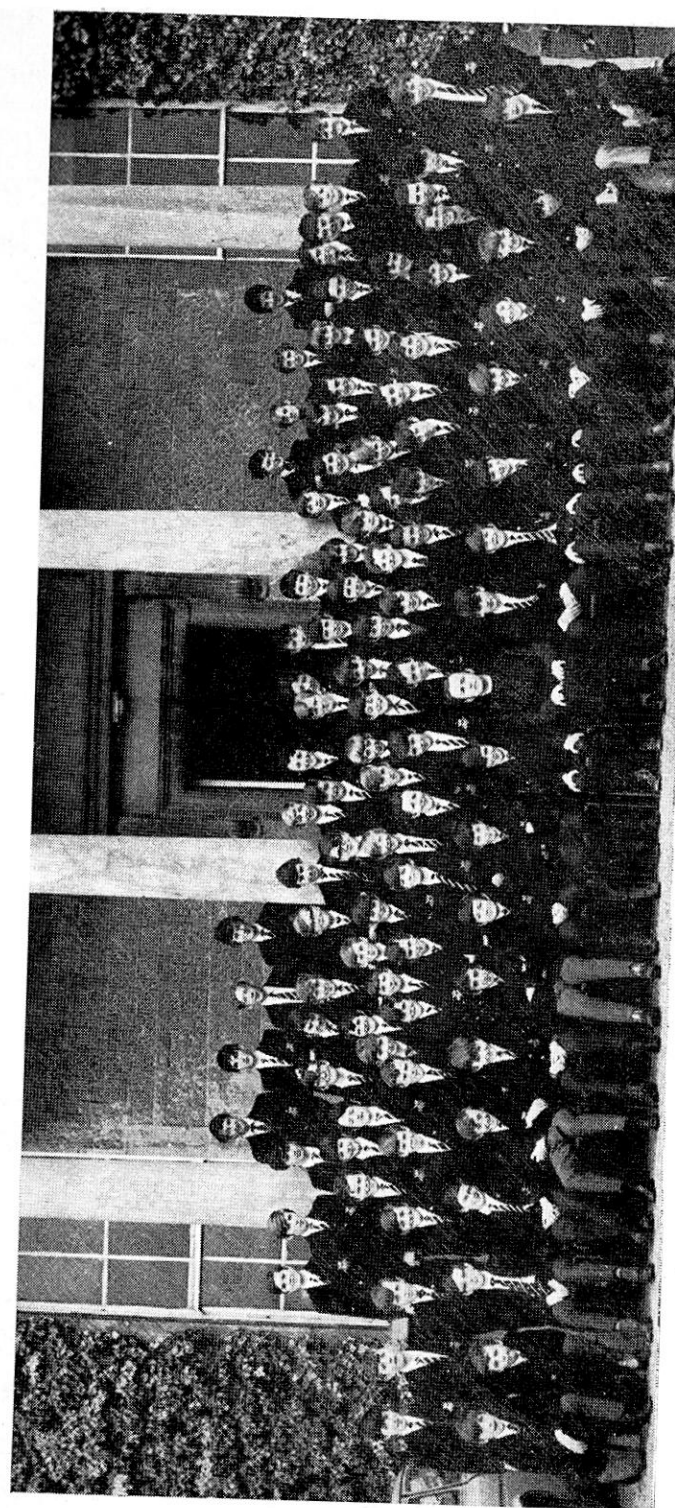
Golden Jubilee Year—1932

The community of Mungret College in jubilee year was as follows: Fr. Edward Dillon, rector; Fr. Thomas Shuley, minister; Fathers John Casey, Martin Corbett, Henry Croasdaile, William Kane, Henry King, Jerome Mahony, Michael Murphy, and the scholastics Messrs Cyril Perrott and William Prendergast. The very few survivors of the community members of that year are noticed elsewhere. We have already noticed Brothers Thomas Casey, James McDonnell and Thomas Murphy who were also members of the Mungret community. It was this community of 1931-32 that were hosts to the distinguished assemblage of archbishops, bishops, priests and laymen who returned to the college to renew their youth in the great year of jubilee. No doubt hopes were high for the college's progress for the next fifty years which would culminate in a century by 1982! Alas! that all who have loved Mungret, alumni and their Jesuit masters, should now realise that that century will never be celebrated.

The golden jubilee was an occasion for recalling the many alumni of Mungret who had brought the name of the college to the farthest parts of the earth. But not a few

members of the Mungret community had themselves also gone overseas and managed to keep in close contact with former pupils now serving the Church in Australia and the United States of America. Here we may present a list of such Jesuits who have not been noticed in this summary.

The joy of jubilee year was offset by the deaths of two of the Fathers mentioned in the preceding list: Fr. Michael Saul, who was also an old alumnus of the college, and Fr. Joseph McCullogh. Both had arrived but recently on the newly-founded Irish Jesuit mission to Hong Kong. They died as martyrs of charity in a cholera epidemic at Canton.

The terms of office of Fathers Edward Dillon, Joseph O'Connor and Jeremiah Kelly proved in the event to have been longer than the rectorships of any of their predecessors if we except the case of Fr. Vincent Byrne. Fr. Dillon, appointed rector 31 May 1931, was no stranger to Mungret. He was here as a scholastic, 1904-07, and later as a priest, 1912-13. In spite of his frail health he insisted on taking his share of classes even when he became rector and he possessed the gift of imparting enthusiasm to his pupils for the Latin classics. He was released from the rectorship in the Summer of 1936 and appointed as church-worker at Gardiner St. Notwithstanding his frail health he was fated to survive to his ninety-fifth year. He died in Dublin on 29 July 1969. His successor, Fr. Joseph O'Connor, a Limerick man, held office from 29 July 1936 until 18 July 1941 when he was transferred to St. Ignatius's, Galway. After many years of devoted work, he died there on 20 May 1972. Fr. Jeremiah Kelly, who succeeded to the rectorship in 1941, was born near Borrisoleigh in 1890 and received his early education at Mungret College. On the completion of his studies he was appointed superior of the apostolic school and continued to fill that post until his appointment as rector. Because of his long association with the college he was known to many Mungret men in all parts of the world. He was an eminently successful

administrator at Mungret but it was an open secret that if the choice had been offered him he would gladly have passed his priestly life in Australia, a country with which he fell in love during his period of regency. After he left Mungret in 1947 his health deteriorated and he died in Dublin on 12 January 1950.

Looking through the records of the 1930s one notices the names of Fathers Cyril Perrott, William Prendergast, Henry King, Henry Croasdaile, Leonard Gallagher and Charles Barrett. Fr. Perrott was at Mungret for his regency, 1930-33, and was afterwards minister of the house, 1938-41. He then served as a chaplain in the last war and on his return to Ireland was appointed to St. Ignatius's Church, Galway. He died there, unexpectedly, after an operation, on 24 April 1952.

Fr. William Prendergast (1906-71) first came to Mungret on the staff, 1928-32, and was later prefect of First Club, 1937-42. He was afterwards a well-known missionary in the country up to the time of his last illness. Fr. Henry Croasdaile (1888-1966) was on the teaching staff from 1931 until 1937. He was a deservedly popular master and—what most impressed his pupils—a highly skilled carpenter, organ-builder and what-not. He later worked in Dublin, teaching religious knowledge in the technical schools and assisting at the retreat house, Rathfarnham Castle. His last years were spent at Emo.

Fathers Leonard Gallagher (1898-1942) and Charles Barrett (1903-44) gave memorable service as prefects of studies for the years, respectively, 1934-37 and 1937-41. Both had this in common that a career of great promise for each in the Society was cut short by an untimely death. Fr. Gallagher, a brother of Fr. Richard Gallagher, on leaving Mungret was appointed to Gardiner St. Church. He died in a polio epidemic in the city on 14 July 1942. Fr. Barrett was appointed prefect of studies at Clongowes in 1941. While watching a rugby match at Donnybrook he collapsed and died on 7 March 1944.

Fr. William Kane (1856-1945) must have personified Mungret for successive generations

of alumni. Between 1902 and the time of his death he had spent, with two temporary absences, forty-two years in the college. He received part of his early education at the Oratory School, Birmingham, and in later life could say that he was taught religious knowledge by no less a person than Cardinal Newman. He was wont to deplore the fact that he was so young and unappreciative when he sat at the great Cardinal's feet! He later studied for the Bar and became a judge in one of the British colonies. It was no legend but fact that when he was a judge he had once to sentence to death a man found guilty of murder. Fr. Kane did not like to be reminded of the fact but while admitting it always protested that he remembered in the Holy Sacrifice the murderer who ended his life on the gallows. He taught in the Arts classes in the time of the Royal University and later in the school of philosophy. The most unperceptive would be forced to admit that Fr. Kane was a great gentleman. His many fine qualities were certainly admirable and his foibles simply adorable. Boys had to be tested in maturity and seriousness before they could be allowed to serve Fr. Kane's daily Mass. The good Father carried out the rubrics with scrupulous regularity but when he arrived at the commemorations of the living and the dead he let himself go. It was touching to hear his long list of relatives and friends amongst the faithful departed. It was interesting to hear the list of the living to be mentioned to the Lord. Relatives and friends, their joys and sorrows were meticulously brought to God's notice; further enlightenment and courage was petitioned for politicians of whom he approved; the politicians on the opposing side got a respectful mention but not with quite the same warmth as his favourites. He was still riding his bicycle when he had passed his eightieth year. Something of the old Mungret died with Fr. William Kane.

A younger contemporary of Fr. Kane's at Mungret was Fr. Jerome Mahony who spent five years of his regency here and later, 1928, returned as prefect of studies. He was to remain on the teaching staff until 1945. For many a returning Mungret man, Fr.

Mahony represented an enduring link with the past and his time and courtesy were ever in inexhaustible supply to make such alumni feel at home. He was incapable of an unkind word; his sense of humour was a delight. A very well-read historian, Fr. Mahony was engaged in research work on the history of the Jesuits in Ireland when he died suddenly at Emo on 5 March 1956.

Fr. Martin Corbett (1876-1957) had completed thirty-three years of unbroken service at Mungret at the time of his death. Like Fathers Kane and Mahony he was as much an institution as a member of the community. From his early years in the Society he suffered from impaired hearing—a malady that would not be so serious in later times with perfected hearing devices. Still he battled bravely with this handicap. He might have become a preacher of distinction if he did not suffer from the fear that he might be speaking too loudly. Yet whatever his deficiency as a public speaker, no one could fail to notice his command of the excellently turned phrase for he had an almost fastidious sense of good English. And for all his seeming aloofness, he followed closely the careers of Mungret boys after their school years.

Fr. Henry King (1889-1963), a native of Castlepollard and alumnus of Clongowes, spent a year as prefect at Mungret, 1924-25, and was prefect again 1931-32. Then for the next four years was minister of the house. For the next six years he was prefect at Clongowes. In 1942 he was appointed to the retreat staff and for some years was stationed at Galway. He was then transferred to Milltown Park where he was to spend the rest of his life. He was one of the best known spiritual directors of his generation. Amongst schoolboys he was remembered as the coach at Clongowes which wrested the Leinster Schools Cup from Belvedere in 1926.

Other bereavements of the Mungret community in the 1950s were occasioned by the deaths of Fathers William McElligott, Daniel MacDonald and Anthony Naughton.

William McElligott (1901-52) was born of Irish parents in London but was orphaned at an early age. His relatives had him brought

up and educated at Bruges so that French was really his native language. He later entered the civil service in England and was a "late vocation", twenty-eight years of age, when he entered the Society. He was prefect at Mungret during his scholastic years, 1933-35 and 1936-37. The last ten years of his life were also spent here and his early death was much regretted by community and our past.

Fr. Daniel MacDonald (1891-1957), a native of Armagh, on the completion of his studies, was appointed to the Hong Kong mission where he spent many fruitful years before ill-health obliged him to return to Ireland. Fortunately for the Irish province and for Mungret College he recovered his health and for the next twelve years his splendid talents were generously at the disposal of the college. In the Summer of 1955 he was appointed superior of the apostolic school, a post certainly to the liking of this priest who always remained a missionary at heart. He died after a very brief illness on 14 May 1957.

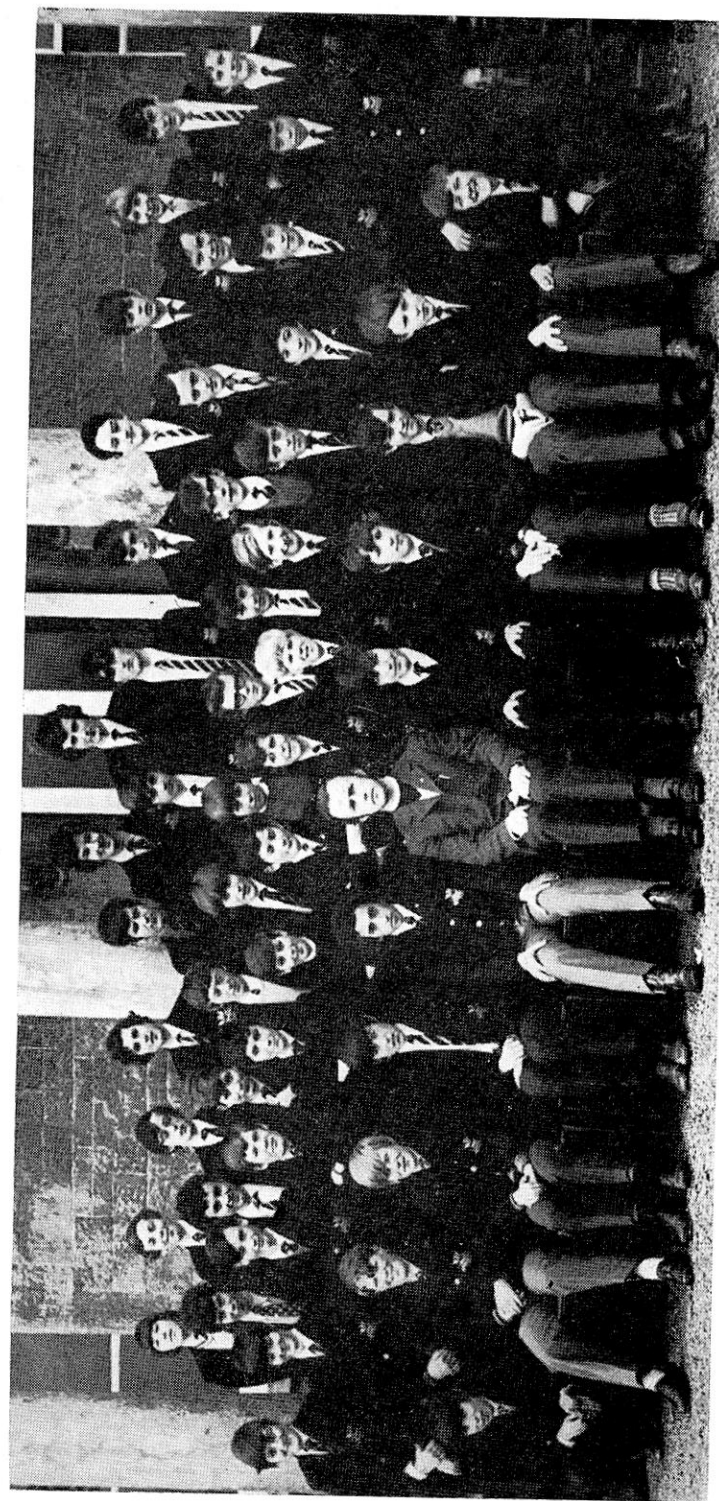
Fr. Anthony Naughton (1900-58), an alumnus of Mungret College, spent his entire priestly life in the service of his old school. For some years he was assistant to the superior of the apostolic school but the greater part of his career in Mungret was spent in teaching. Ever since the completion of his studies he was afflicted with feeble eyesight. It is to be feared that his pupils only too often took advantage of his infirmity and his classes in consequence were not noteworthy for good order. Noise from a classroom invariably meant that Fr. Tony was in there. But it should be stressed that the boys adored him. And in spite of his disorderly classes, his pupils invariably made the grade at the public examinations. For many years he did not rely on his books—his eyesight prevented him from reading; still, he knew the subject matter of his classes and was able to impart knowledge. And in times of crisis, his pupils relied heavily upon him. He had an uncanny way of "spotting form" on an exam paper and his wayward pupils knew it. It is an understatement to say that he was beloved by his community and pupils. He died after a brief illness on 25 June 1958.

On 17 May 1959 Fr. Charles Heron died suddenly in Dublin. He was only forty-five at the time of his death. He taught as a scholastic at Mungret, 1942-44, and after his ordination came back as minister of the house, 1949-51. His later years were spent as master of French at Belvedere.

Fr. Jeremiah Kelly's successor as rector, Fr. Brian MacMahon, took up office on 25 July 1947 but after three years was appointed to the mission in Zambia. For the next ten years he fulfilled a great man's part in that country until a fatal illness compelled him to return for treatment to Ireland. He died in Dublin, aged fifty-three, on 15 August 1960.

Fr. Stephen Curran (1911-60), an alumnus of Mungret and a native Irish speaker from Co. Galway, spent all his priestly life in the service of the college. He came here on the completion of his studies in 1947 and proved himself a devoted teacher until his last illness. He must have been one of the most respected and beloved masters who ever taught at Mungret. When heart trouble manifested itself in the late Spring of 1960 he was sent to Cork to be operated on. The operation seemed at first to be successful but he died on 2 June 1960 and his funeral at Mungret was an occasion of deep and heartfelt mourning for his community no less than his pupils.

After the lamented death of Fr. Stephen Curran, there were no further bereavements in the community until the death of Br. Murphy, 1968, which we have already noted. The following year, however, Fr. John Deevey was called to his reward on March 10. A native of Waterford, and alumnus of Mungret, he first joined the community as a scholastic in 1914 and spent two years on the teaching staff. He returned as a priest in 1923 and spent another three years at Mungret. For many years subsequently he was a member of the Emo community but returned to Mungret in 1954 and was destined to spend the remainder of his life here. Much of his active life was spent as superior or bursar at Emo. In his latter years at Mungret he compiled a valuable catalogue of

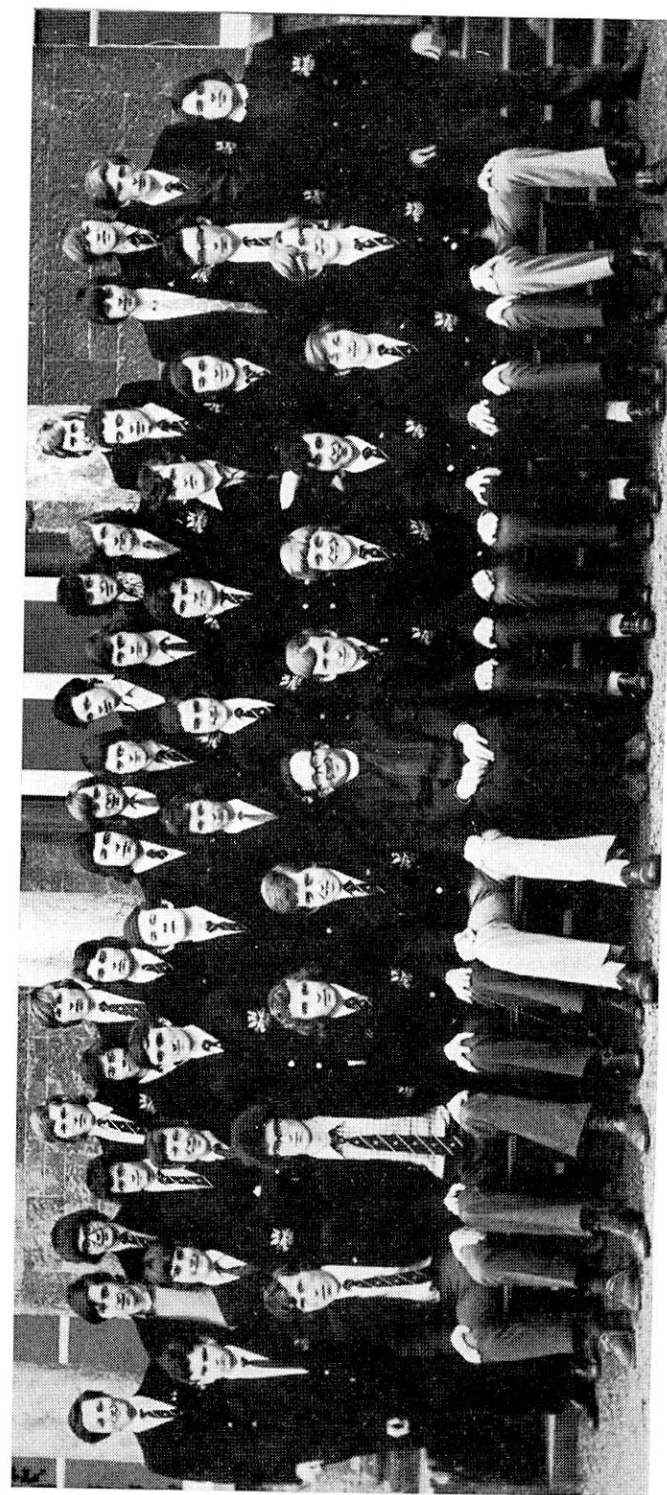
Mungret alumni, lay and apostolic for the years 1882-1963.

On 27 July 1971 Fr. Michael Murphy died. Born at Ballybay, Co. Monaghan, in 1894, he entered the Society before he had completed his studies for the Arts degree at University College, Dublin. He completed his studies for his degree (in mathematics) after his first religious profession. He first came to Mungret in 1931 and for the next three years an all-round improvement in studies made itself felt. He was then transferred to Rathfarnham as prefect of studies of scholastics and was later prefect of studies at the Crescent. In 1945 he came back as prefect of studies to Mungret and discharged that important office with success until 1955 when he was replaced by the late Fr. Michael Erraught. But for the next three years, 1955-58, he continued as a member of the teaching staff. The next eleven years he spent at Emo where he held the position of bursar. When Emo was sold, Fr. Murphy returned once again to Mungret but his health was now deteriorating. It is no exaggeration to say that Fr. Murphy proved to be one of the ablest prefects of studies ever produced by the Irish province of the Society. He never made the mistake of concentrating his interests and energies on the "successful" type classes. He had a deep sense of justice and never forgot the weak class or the weaker members. The name of the weaker pupil was conscientiously entered on his little notebook and meticulous enquiries were then regularly made to the boy's master to find out how the boy's studies were progressing. He gave the impression of aloofness until the pupil suddenly discovered that his record of success or failure was known in intimate detail by Fr. Murphy. Needless to say Fr. Murphy enjoyed the confidence and trust of pupils' parents. It can be confidently predicted that when the history of Mungret College comes to be written, Fr. Michael Murphy will receive honourable mention as a man who worked conscientiously and successfully for the good of the young men committed to his guidance.

A few months before the death of Fr. Murphy, his successor as prefect of studies

in 1955, Fr. Michael Erraught, died in Dublin. Fr. Erraught, a native of Tralee, was born in 1913 and entered the Society in 1934. Throughout his scholastic career he was a perfectionist and his entire ministry in the Society was distinguished. After the completion of his studies he was a valued member of the teaching staff at Clongowes until 1953 when he was transferred to Mungret. Two years later he was appointed prefect of studies and discharged that office with his customary dedication and ability until 1960 when he returned to Clongowes. During his years at Mungret he had the science laboratories refitted and provision made for such useful hobbies as carpentry, pottery, etc. In 1967 he was appointed to the mission staff ... even in his teaching days he had become one of the best-known spiritual directors in the country and his appointment to the mission staff was made at the request of many priests who had already become acquainted with him. Alas, his missionary career was brief. Heart trouble developed after some three years. He was then appointed to Leeson Street residence in 1970. He did not regard the change as a signal for rest. He applied himself to writing for the Sodality but after a short illness died in Dublin, 13 March 1971.

Mungret men who recall the distinguished appearance of Fr. Erraught will remember also one of his contemporaries in the community who also happened to be a man of remarkable stature. This was Fr. Brendan Barry, a native of Limerick city, who was born in 1920 and entered the Society in 1937. His ability in his studies but most of all his gifts of mind and heart marked him out for a man likely to hold high office in the Society. He was ordained priest in 1950 and on the completion of his studies was appointed minister at St. Ignatius's, Galway. After a year there he was appointed minister at Milltown Park. On the death of Fr. Dan MacDonald, he was appointed superior of the apostolic school but his sojourn at Mungret proved to be brief. Two years later, June 1959, he became socius to the Provincial and on September 14 was appointed rector at Milltown Park. On 5 October 1965 he was

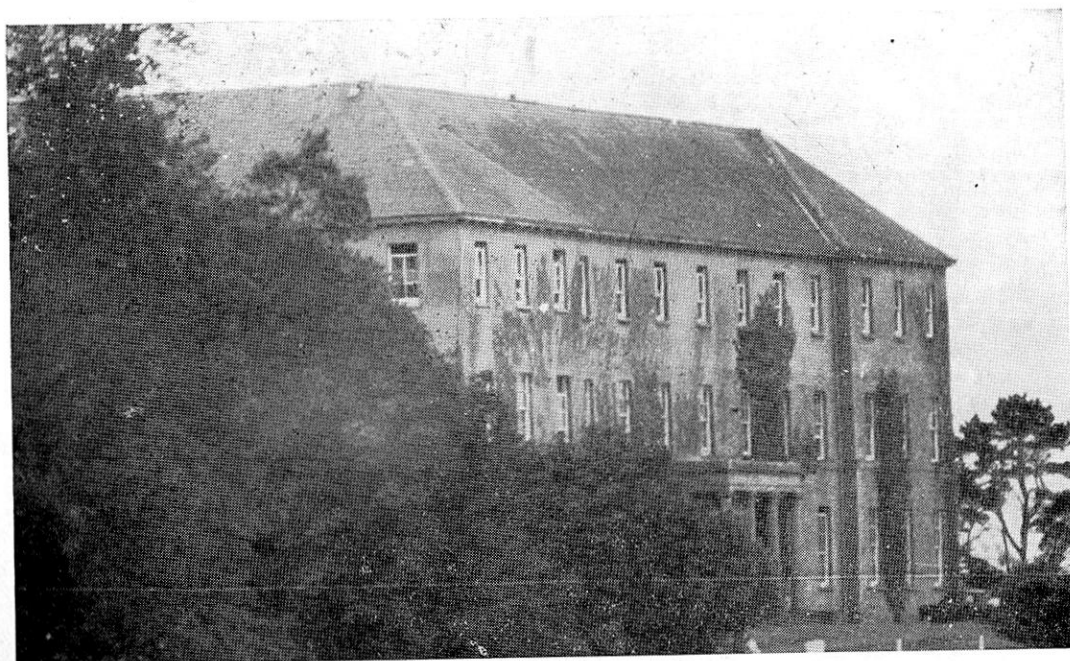

appointed Provincial but remained in office for only one three year term. His taste was not for administration but spiritual direction and when he laid down his high office he became an almost legendary figure amongst the students of Clonliffe College and the house of the Loreto Congregation. He died with tragic suddenness on 30 January 1972 and his funeral Mass at Gardiner Street was an unforgettable occasion in a church that has witnessed so many final tributes to the illustrious dead.

Our record of former members (deceased) of the Mungret community closes with this brief account of Fr. Fred Paye (1895-1972). Fred Paye, a native of Fermoy, studied at Mungret College, 1912-14. After his first religious profession he proved an industrious student and gave advance notice of the competence and devotion he would afterwards display in the different ministries appointed him in the Society. His first term as a member of the Mungret community was brief, only one year, 1928-29, but when he came back on the teaching staff in 1939 he was to give of his best to his old school for the next sixteen years. None of his pupils could fail to detect in this very undemonstrative priest the

stuff of a genuine patriot. Like his rector in his schooldays at Mungret, Fr. Edward Cahill, his twin ideals were faith and fatherland. He was an enthusiastic, but tolerant master of the Irish language and was able to communicate to many his own love of the same language. When he retired from teaching in 1955 it was really to enter on a new and stimulating apostolate he exercised up to the time of his last illness. At Gardiner Street his energies were inexhaustible in doing good and his time and ability were generously expended in helping the distressed to face more cheerfully the burden of life. He died in Dublin on 21 May 1972.

We have tried to present in the foregoing survey some account of the Jesuits who passed through Mungret. Space does not permit a complete account. Some Jesuits are passed over in silence simply because their association with Mungret was short. This does not of course mean that such men did not later leave their mark upon many useful ministries undertaken by the Irish province. And anyway many of the omissions have long ago been made good in the pages of the *Mungret Annual*.



Headmaster's Address

Seven years spent in close contact with Mungret make me feel qualified to generalise on some of the qualities I have encountered during that time. First of all, I might comment on the family spirit of the place. This arose, partly, from the reasonable size of the college: 225 boarders plus 25 day-boarders. In simple ways it was manifest: anyone coming to Mungret in any capacity was accepted with his whole family. It always warmed the heart to see teenage boys welcome their fathers and mothers and show their younger brothers and sisters around the place.

Perhaps I am fortunate, but I have not yet come across a disgruntled past Mungret boy. The smile of recognition and the hand of friendship always seem to be there. A cynic might say: Mungret boys are taught to be good actors—but I feel I am competent to distinguish between reality and illusion. Of course it would be unrealistic to aver that we never had a row here in Mungret—but then even the best families have that from time to time!

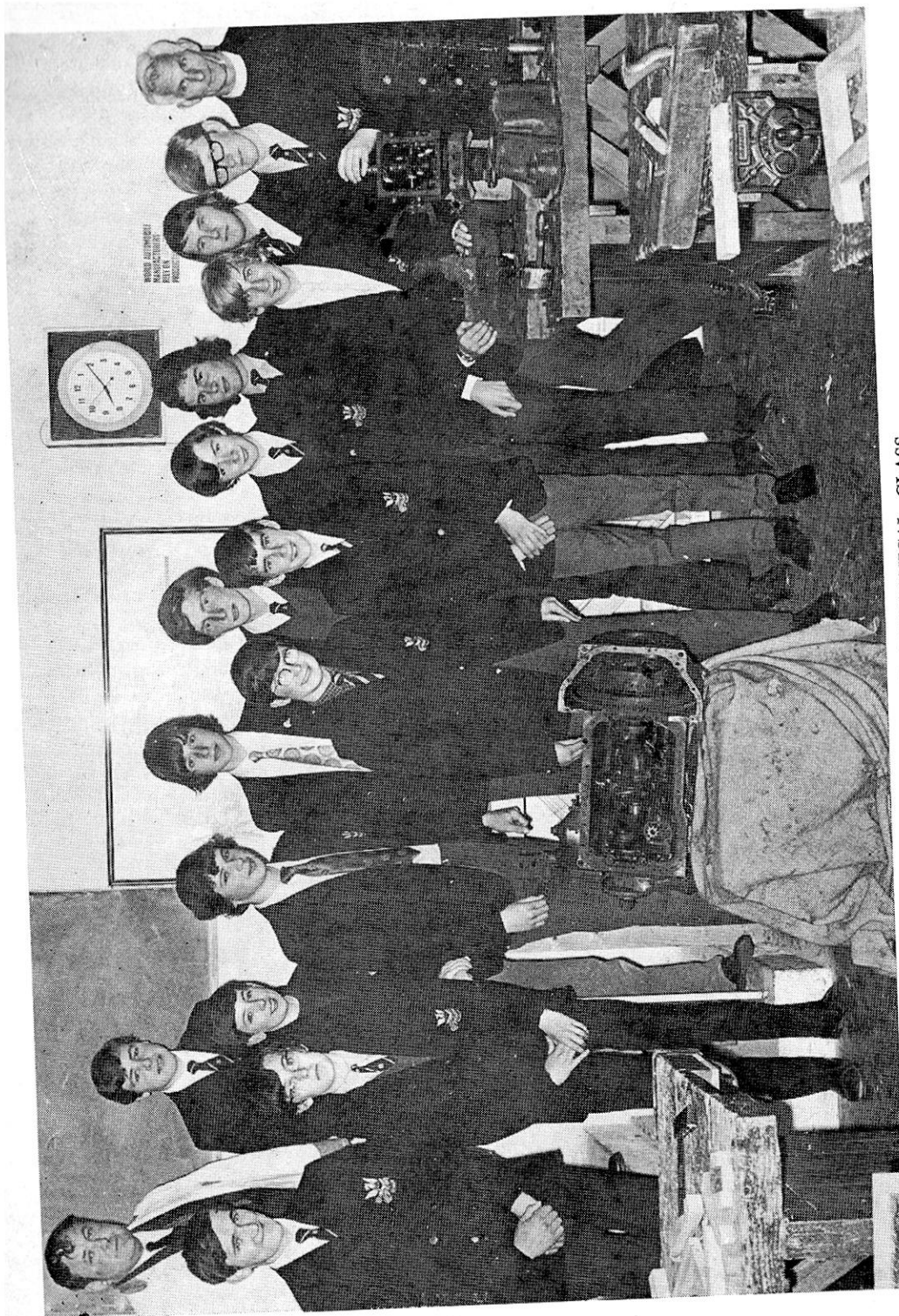
It is a truism to speak of the primary role of parents in education. The quality of parents therefore is all-important, and I am certain that, taken as a group, the parents of Mungret boys are people whose priorities are right. They value the formation of character above any other form of educational success. Although we did not hold parent-teacher meetings there was always plenty of contact between school and home, and I never felt that there was anything other than co-operation existing between them.

In this our last year, the Jesuit community at Mungret numbers twelve—eight priests and four brothers, but it numbered more than twenty when I came here first. Soon we will be dispersed but I know that living together in Mungret has been an experience for each Jesuit for which he is grateful to God. I think of the four Jesuits who died in Mungret in recent years, Fr. John Deevy (March 1969), Br. Murphy (October 1968),

Fr. Michael Murphy (July 1971), and Fr. Bill Merritt (April 1973). All of them had rich and long associations with Mungret and had the best type of family pride in the place and everyone connected with it.

I have several times at official functions spoken of the quality of the lay staff here in Mungret. I need only list them to prove my argument, Mr. Tom Conway now in retirement, Mr. Paddy McGrath who was taken from us so swiftly and tragically, Mr. Gerald Walsh our first vice-principal, still with us, Mr. Michael MacMahon now teaching in Limerick, Mr. John Moloney still with us, Mr. Cyril Ó Céirín now teaching in Limerick, Mr. Seán Geary now teaching in Tralee, Mr. Michael McCarthy, Mr. Billy Conway, and Mr. Pat Smalle—not to speak of our lady teachers: Mrs. Moira Moloney, our first full-time lady teacher, Mrs. Dáiríne Byrne, Mrs. Hilary O'Farrelly, Mrs. Gráinne MacMahon and Mrs. Mary O'Kelly. Without fear of contradiction I can praise each and every one for wholehearted interest and co-operation. For the last time unfortunately, I thank them on behalf of Mungret College of which they have formed so valuable a part.

Recently I was paging through an education periodical and I saw reflected there some of the pressures to which all educationalists have been subject in the 1960s and 1970s. We had the cult of the teenager which has tended to accentuate the kind of tension which must of necessity exist between the generations. This cult led to the questioning of structures and of values—a good thing in itself. Unfortunately in some countries this led to the proclamation by educationalists of what has been termed the Gadarene heresy which takes its name from the Gospel incident culminating in the headlong flight to destruction of a herd of swine. This heresy might be summed up as follows: "It is not our job to tell the young what to do, but to give them their heads and leave them free from direction and stand by to pick up the

pieces." All heresies hold part of the truth and this particular one, which seems to be losing momentum demands that we educationalists should not lose our nerve but that at the same time we realise (a) that young people have a right to authority; (b) that they have a right to the *right* kind of authority; (c) that we as Christian educationists should be able to point to the Source of Authority.

I do not believe that Mungret lost its nerve in the 1960s and 1970s but there was certainly a lessening of some of the rigidities of school life, discipline became more flexible and less formality prevailed.

With the higher academic entrance standards demanded by university authorities, the pressure for good examination results increased. In passing I would remark that examination pressure is not always quite the unmixed evil that it is painted but it can distort teaching and give learning a bad taste. I append a table to show the statistical outline of public examination results since 1968. It is only those who passed through

Mungret in those years who can say and prove that Mungret's only interest was not examination results.

And so I conclude this short note.

I have not the slightest doubt of the educational apostolate of the Jesuit. This is because I believe intensely, as I think every Christian must, in the value of the human person, who must learn so to pass through the good things of time that he does not lose the things of eternity. The spiritual, the cultural, the academic, the sporting must all be synthesised so that the growth in Christ which was fostered during the five years spent in Mungret as a boy may continue throughout a man's life.

There are no short-term, quick results in true education and so Mungret will continue to live as long as a Mungret man lives who tries with God's grace to be true to the principles inculcated there right through the years from 1882 down to 1974.

"You must be mad"

Every Mungret boy has his own stories of the classroom, the eccentricities of Fr. So and So, the dormitory escapades—the night he outwitted the First Prefect, the forced swim in the pool at 3 a.m.! What follows is a view of Mungret from the front of the class and the *Aunt Sally* position of First Prefect and teacher; one Jesuit's personal account of the last four years of Mungret. What was life as a Jesuit like in Mungret 1970-74?

"Wiping the noses of snotty orphans in the colleges", as one somewhat cynical man described our educational apostolate; it is not the most glamorous of careers. When I announced my desire to return to colleges after ordination, my contemporaries were taken aback: "You must be mad," they said, "why, you could have a brilliant career" ... what at, was never specified! Fr. Provincial saw it my way, and I arrived in Mungret in August 1970. Due to an emergency I found myself landed with the job of First Prefect. The emergency lasted two years until Fr. Michael Sheil came along in 1972 and I became a teacher and counsellor up to the end of Mungret's active life.

Impressions

From the beginning I loved the place. Mungret turned out to be the friendliest community and boys I'd lived with, and this remains my strongest impression of the college. The boys were easy to talk to and great fun to be with; of course, they also could break your heart, especially from the point of view of First Prefect.

Recently a boy asked me: "What will you do now?" I said I hope to go to another college, preferably Clongowes since I really enjoy working in a boarding school, as it gives me more scope. "You must be mad," he retorted ... I try to explain. To me education is the greatest thing a Jesuit can do—there is a permanence and stability about it, unlike, say, retreats, where you do a quick

job for a week and move on: in the colleges the influence and the contact is steady and develops over the years. There we are dealing with young people with questioning minds, who are looking for ideals and ideas, open to inspiration and encouragement. They present a real challenge to a teacher: to develop and foster the growth of a real talent; to help a boy to get the best out of himself. No more rewarding apostolate comes to my mind. Oh, there are plenty of heartbreaks, failures and frustrations, as the teacher labours in the "apostolate of the obvious", and the students cannot or will not respond!

Further, education is much more than getting the boys through examinations: there is the thrill of discovering literature, music, art and the theatre. Over the last four years I have got a lot of entertainment—and quite a few headaches—from the Mungret Dramsoc. Many boys, however, who did not otherwise shine found themselves blossom on the boards of the stage, where they revealed quite unexpected qualities. This in itself is sufficient reward for the producer.

Then there is the thrill, the experience, of watching the boys develop skills on the playing field. A teacher can learn an enormous amount about "his" boys from coaching on the football or other sports field. Boys' characters are often moulded in the pressure situations which occur on the playing fields. Quite apart from keeping me fit (which it did!), it kept me interested and active in the boys overall development. Also while we are all mixing on the level of sport we get to know each other on different levels; this helps me to be able to help individuals more and more.

It is not just as a professional educator, however, that I am in the educational business: I am a Jesuit priest, and that is primary. "You must be mad" again is the suggestion of some of the boys. I've given up a lot of what they value: money, a home, a posi-

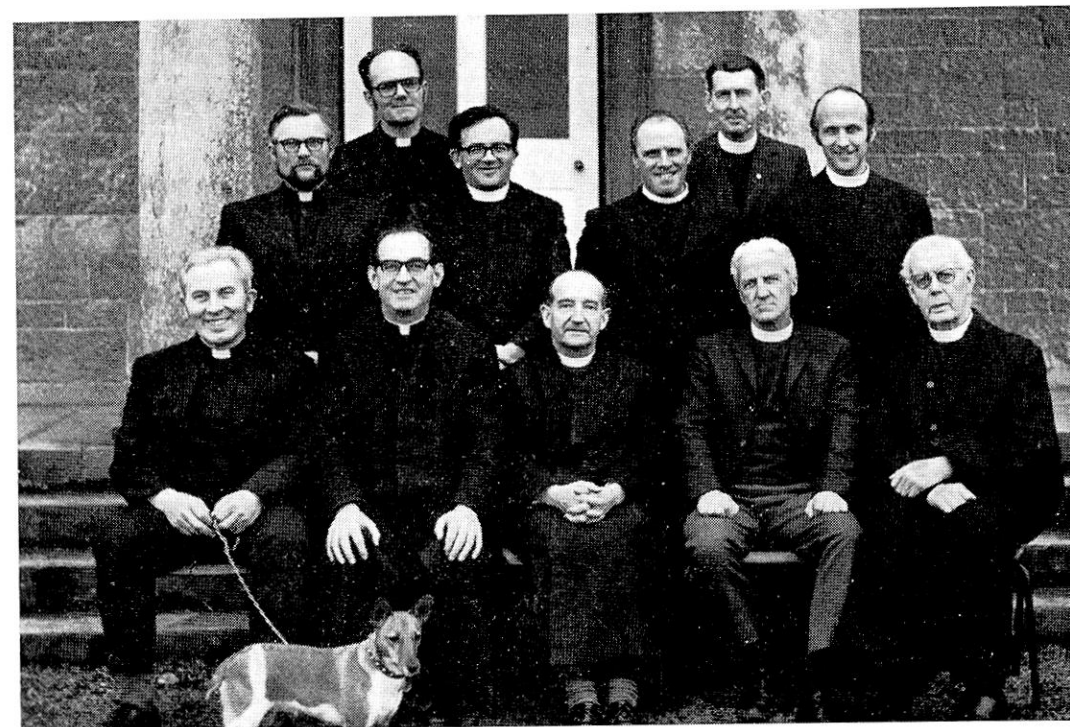
tion of importance—many of the good things of life, to be a "Jay" and a priest! For many I represent a challenge; to some, a contradiction. But as a Jesuit priest involved in education I am anxious to see the boys develop as Christians, personally responsible young men who practice their Catholicism from conviction.

Mungret, then, has been a place where I have been very happy to work. The boys respond; they are friendly, warmhearted,

open to encouragement, and they accept the challenges of idealism well. Not saints, of course, and perhaps lacking some of the sort of ambitions that characterise Dublin boys: but nonetheless wonderful fellows, for whom it has been a real pleasure to work and with whom it has been most rewarding to play and pray. The spirit of Mungret will remain with me as long as I have breath. Someone will remind me: You must be mad.

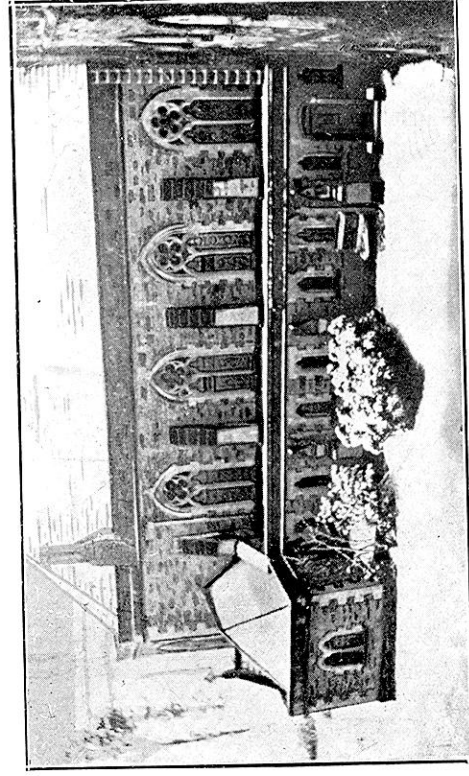

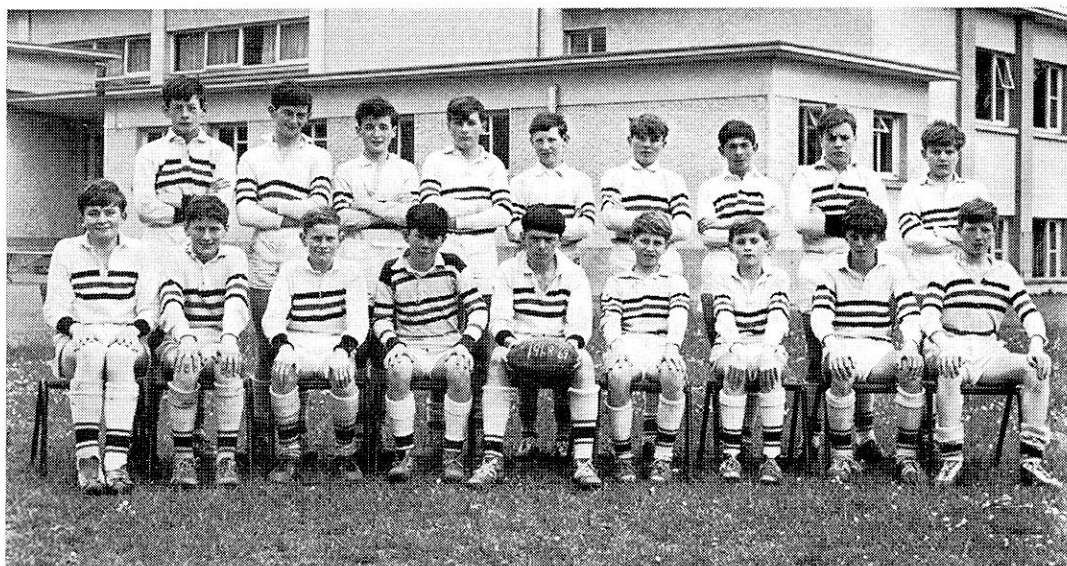

The introduction of a new strip for the Senior XV by Fr. T. Morrissey brought a new look—but, alas, no better fortune in the Senior Cup. Mungret senior teams in recent years were promising but fell by the wayside in the cup. In 1969 we lost to Rockwell. In 1970 again Rockwell pipped us in the last few minutes. In 1971 we rejoiced in the heaviest pack in Munster—the front row alone chalked up 42 stone! This time it was cruel misfortune that smote us: we lost our out-half with a broken elbow in the first few minutes and a forward was reduced to a hobbling passenger a few moments later. St. Munchin's beat our thirteen in the semi-final (we had snatched victory in injury time against Glenstal); and it was cold comfort that we beat the Munchin's team in the City Cup after Easter. We lost in the final of this cup to Crescent. St. Munchin's again proved our downfall in 1972 in the Munster Cup; and in 1973 we were disappointingly beaten by Crescent.

But, while the senior team dominates the rugby season it is not alone; and while we struggled to no avail in the top group others kept the name of Mungret on a number of trophies. The Limerick Seconds Shield almost became our property for a while. We won it in 1969, 70, 71 and again in 1973. We also won the O'Brien Cup in 1970, and reached the final in 1971 and 73, losing to C.B.C. Cork, and Rockwell respectively.

Our junior teams have not enjoyed much luck and with the gradual running down of personnel the number of boys to select from over the past two years has been seriously reduced. The most successful team was the 1971 side which won the City Cup—the only time we have ever won the Junior City Cup. This same team were defeated 5-3 by C.B.C. Cork (the eventual winners) in the Munster Junior Cup. The 1972 team had a good run in the Munster Cup, due to a favourable draw, and gave Presentation, Cork, a very hard run in the semi-final. The 14s won

their league in 1969; and the 15s won their cup in 1970.

Our last season, 1974, has been a distinguished one. Fr. M. Sheil coached the Munster schools team to their first ever "grand slam" against the other three provinces. The college presented two new trophies to the Munster Branch for competition in the preliminary sections of the Schools Senior and Junior Cups. To be called respectively the Mungret Cup and the Mungret Shield, they will keep the name of the college in its honoured place in Munster schools rugby. Because of our small numbers and so our very limited playing strength, we entered the preliminary section in both cups this year.

The senior team, which has had a triumphant season with fourteen wins in a row, captured the Mungret Cup by defeating Glenstal (27-3); St. Ita's (29-0); and Waterpark (25-10). However, our hopes of possible Munster Cup triumph were dashed in the first minute of the game against C.B.C. Cork, when we lost Robert Morgan with a split forehead. Gamely, though, our fourteen carried on with the match. But C.B.C. were too strong for our depleted forces.

The season ended with a great glut of games—held over due to the flu—and in a blaze of triumph. In a very enjoyable Past v. Present game—Seamus Dennison and Vinnie Becker, our two recent internationals—headed a strong side which just overcame

the Present by 26 points to 24. Earlier in the day our juniors completed an enjoyable year by playing well against a much stronger St. Munchin's team, but losing by 16-4. On Monday, April 1, we collected two trophies. To mark the final game between the two schools, St. Munchin's presented us with a splendid trophy and we returned the compliment. Our team were not so generous, and we won the Seconds Shield by 12-10 in a really exciting finish.

Tuesday, April 2, was the Under 15s day. With only sixteen boys eligible we had deservedly beaten St. Munchin's 3-0, and now won the Under 15s Cup by beating Crescent in Dooradoyle, 7-3. The climax to a hectic and very successful week came on Thursday, April 4, when we went to Waterpark to play the final of the O'Brien Cup. There we defeated a very gallant Waterpark team by 23-6; the issue was in doubt until the last few minutes, when desperate measures by Waterpark led to mistakes and two easy tries for us.

So with three trophies in four days, there were unforgettable scenes of jubilation on the Stone Corridor, and the First Prefect was carried shoulder high in a triumphant tour of the school and dormitories. A really splendid end to a most enjoyable season, which, statistically might look like this:

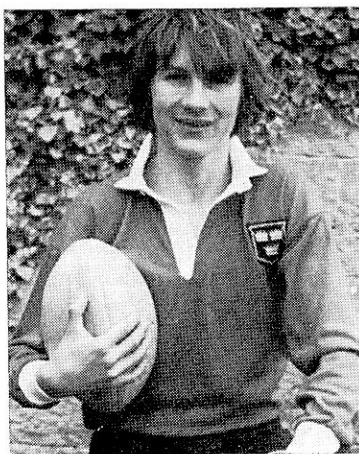

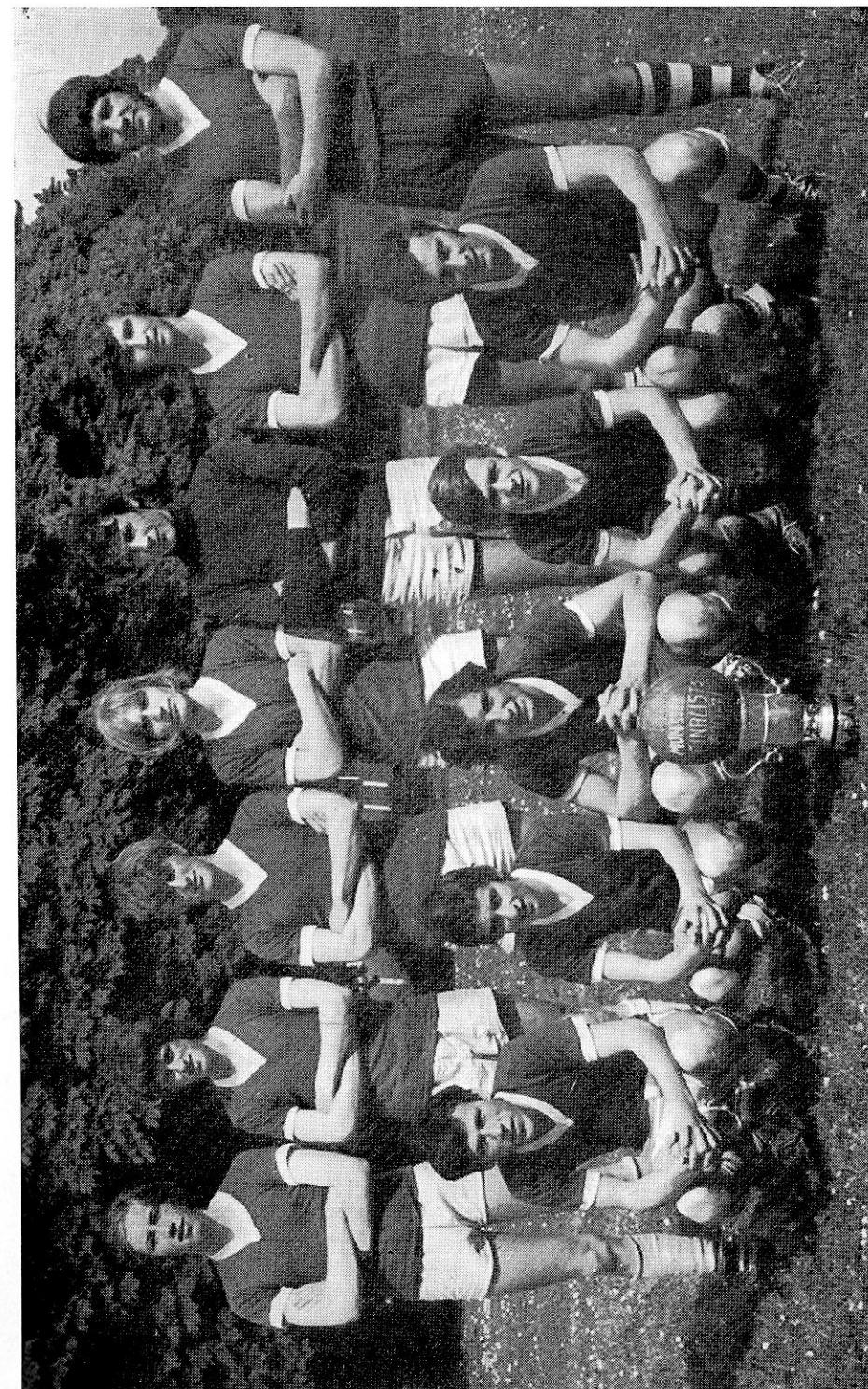

Over the last five or so years I think I can say with honesty that swimming has been by far Mungret's most successful sport. The accompanying list of championship and medal winners (my apologies for any omissions) clearly shows this. As with other sports worth the involvement, success follows close upon honest endeavour, and this endeavour was always ever-present within the confines of the swimming pool in Mungret.

Though the college closes its doors for the last time this June, the name of the Mungret Swimming Club will live on for years to come within swimming circles throughout

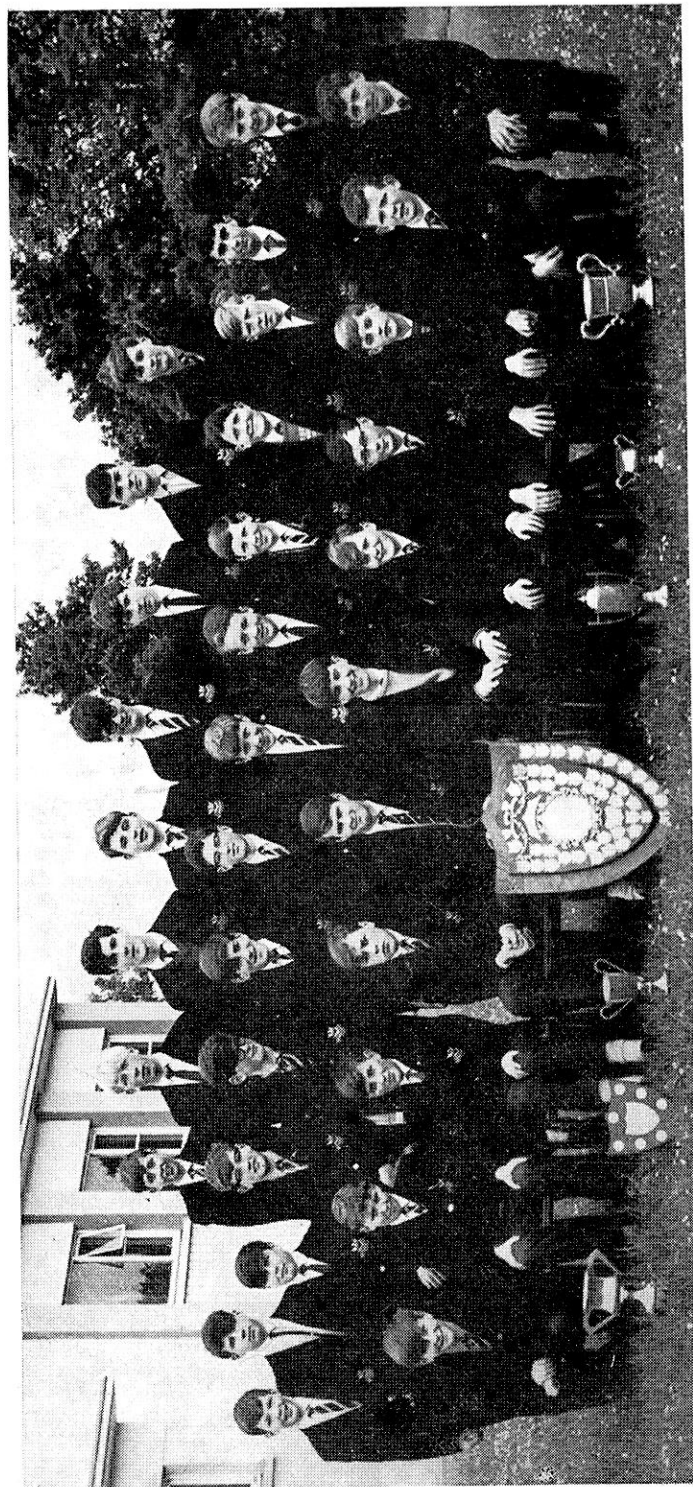
the country, due to the consistent successful efforts of our swimmers. Without doubt, Martin McGrory has been by far our most successful swimmer. While he was in Mungret, 1970 was his most successful year. During that year he became All-Ireland schoolboy champion for the 100 metres senior breaststroke event, and also that year saw him capture the men's 100 and 200 metres breaststroke events at the national championships. Also during that year he gained his first of many international caps, and, sadly, just failed to qualify for the Munich Olympics in 1972.

force to be reckoned with, John and Martin were our only swimmers to take Irish school-boy titles.

Our main strength has always been in the area of squadron events, and one of our most successful years was 1971, when we captured all six squadron titles at the Munster championships. Sadly, however, we failed to make an impression at the nationals. 1973 was also a very successful year. In that year our two senior squads took the Munster titles, and our medley squad came second in the national championships, behind R.B.A.I., with both teams bettering the previous All-Ireland record. Our freestyle squad took the

third position at the same championships.

As with all sports, however, success cannot be achieved through the efforts of the competitors alone, and it is here that we are indebted to the non-stop efforts of Fr. Eric Cantillon, S.J. His enthusiasm and expertise in the sport, and his willingness to give advice were vital factors in gaining the success that we did. I know that every swimmer who competed for the college will agree with me on this point and we all join together in wishing him continued success in his new position of coach in Belvedere.

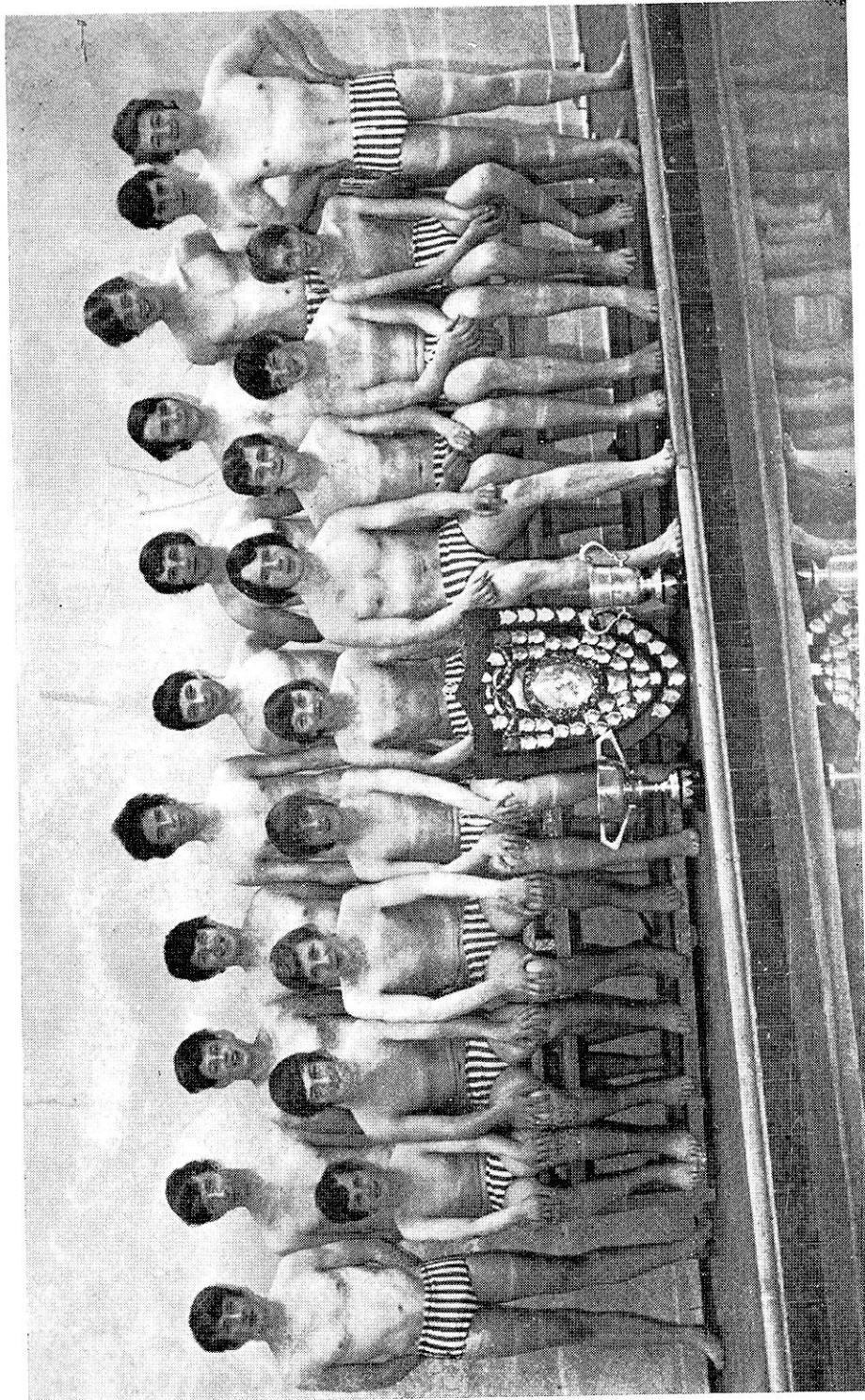

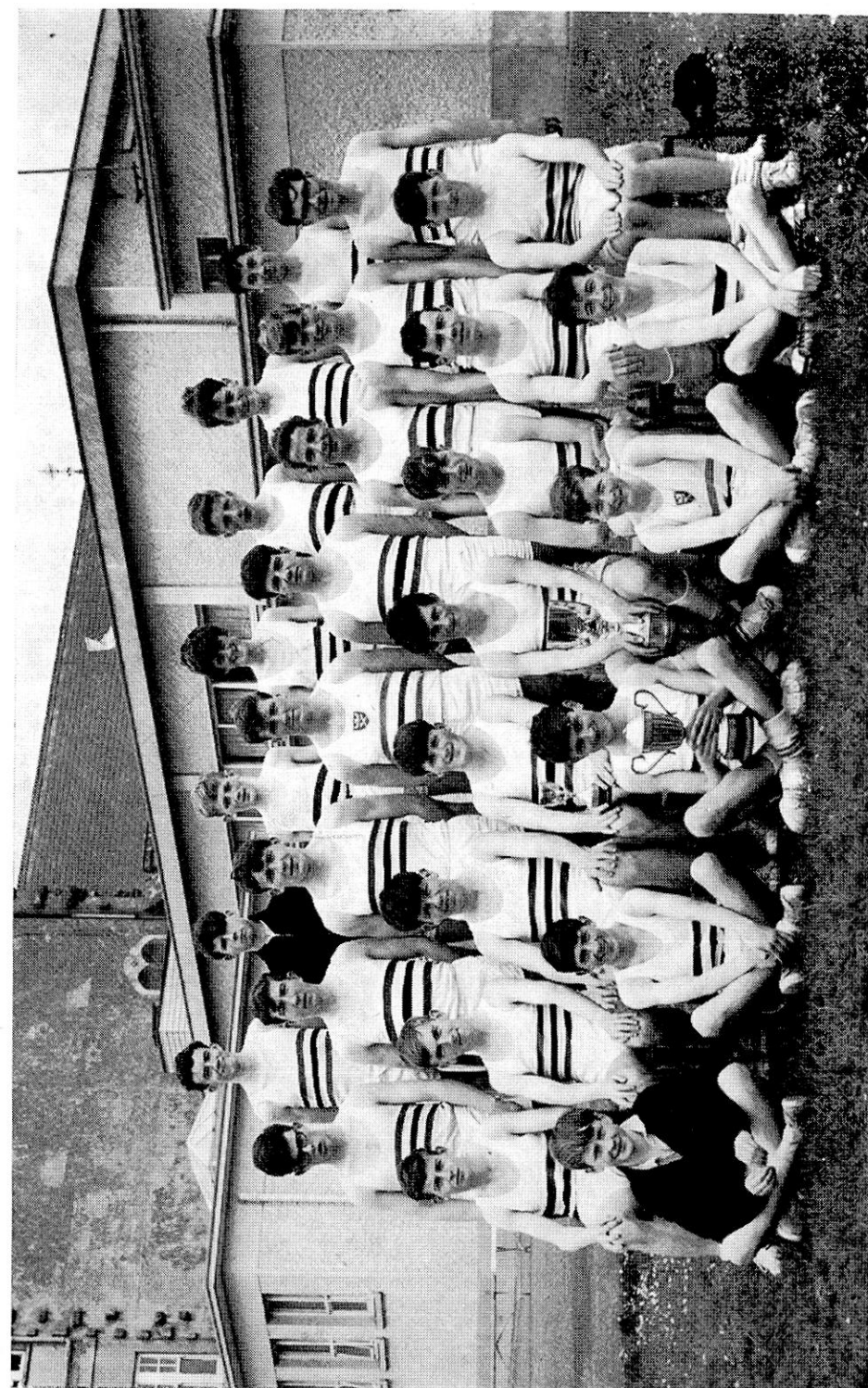
ATHLETICS

Lapping round a track while everyone else is lazing in the sun is never the choice of the majority so athletics is the Summer game of a devoted minority. Mungret's minority have managed to give a good account of themselves in recent years.

In 1971 and 72 before the effects of our phase-out made it impossible to field junior athletes, our entries for the North Munster Sports topped forty—many of these being in fact more honorary than serious competitors. Nonetheless, we won the Track Cup in North Munster in 1971—a very good year for our athletes. David Hardiman won all before him in the junior events that year winning the 100 and 200 metres in North Munster, Munster and in the All-Ireland. He also enabled our inter relay to win the Munster baton for the first time—they got

third in the All-Ireland. Our senior relay also won the Munster baton in 1971 and again in 1972.

Indeed the relays were such a Mungret speciality—our junior relay of 1970 still hold the North Munster record—that St. Munchin's asked Fr. Coghlan to coach their junior relay in 1973 and they won the Munster title. This kind of co-operation and friendliness between Mungret and other colleges, particularly Glenstal and St. Munchin's, has been one of the most rewarding features of athletics in recent years. When we decided to make a special effort in field events from 1971 our boys were coached by Fr. McNamee in St. Munchin's and to good effect—we won medals in North Munster in 1971, 72 and 73 with Seamus Lynch (hammer and discus), Joe Melody (javelin) and

Stalwart members of relay teams in the years 1971-73, most of whom got medals of one kind or another in North Munster, were Des O'Halloran, Paddy O'Dwyer, Philip Toomey, David Doyle, Kieran McGrory, Paul Kerrigan, Eugene Carley, Peter McCarthy, Peter and Robert Morgan and Tom Barrett. A place of his own goes to Eddie Cogan who having won many medals in junior and intermediate grades finally in his last year, 1973, reached the top, winning the 400 metres hurdles All-Ireland Championship and coming second in the 400 metres. He had, of course, won both these in North Munster and Munster. Eddie was chosen to represent Ireland later in the

Summer. The 1973 squad also produced Munster champions in the inter relay and junior hammer (Gerry Danaher), and inter steeplechase (Peter Morgan)—he finished second in Dublin.

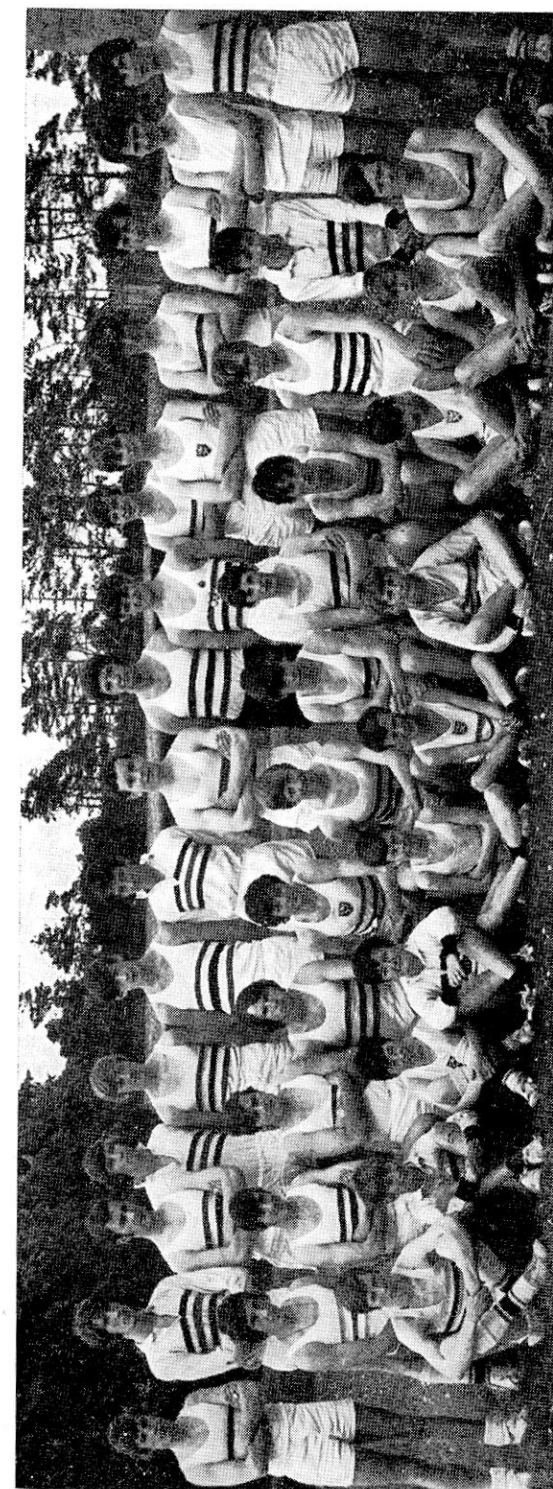

The tennis players all benefited—a word of advice, a quiet admonition, an encouraging pat on the back, and, above all, the support of a constantly interested presence—and the results showed it. In 1972 Mungret presented a trophy for Under 14 competition and we reached the final. In 1973 we

went one better and won the trophy on our last appearance at that level. Winning team: John Nolan, Willie FitzGerald, Pat Buckley, Thomas O'Connor, Paddy Lynch and J. B. Lynch.

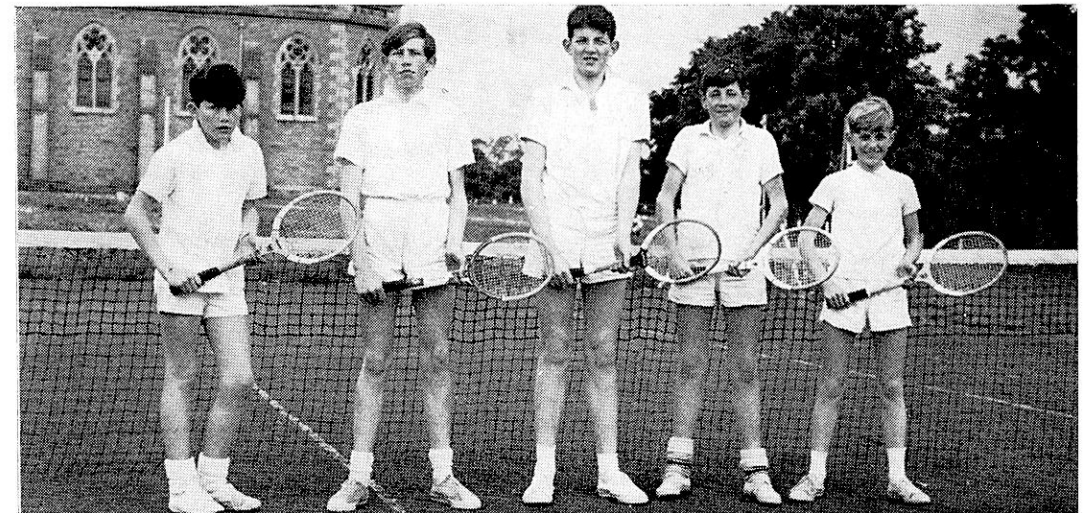

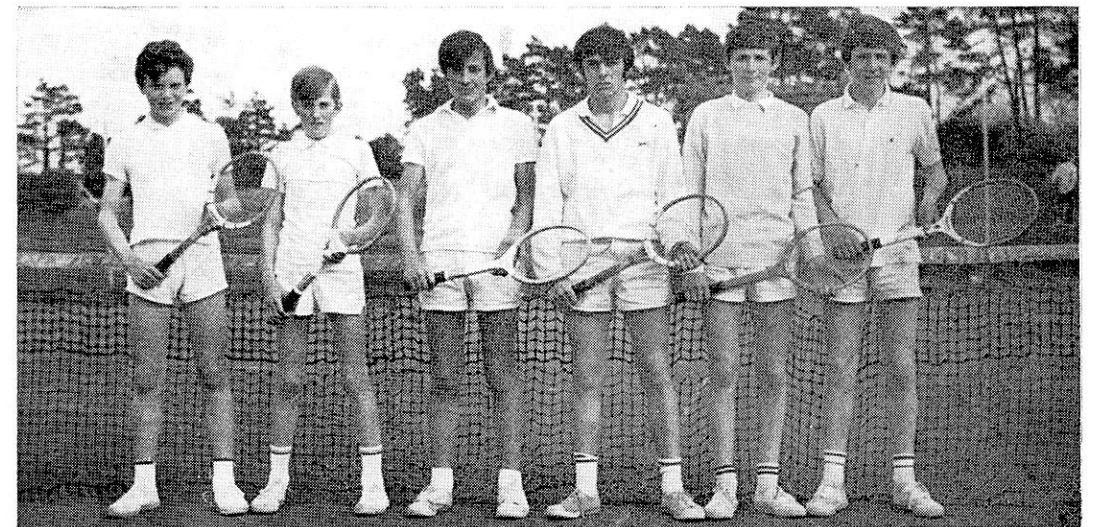
JUNIOR TENNIS 1972

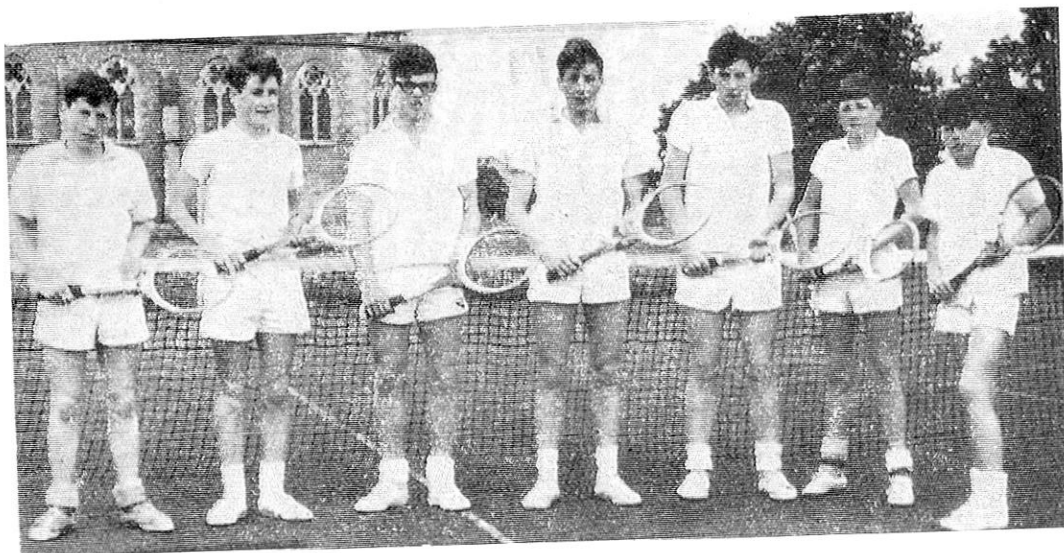

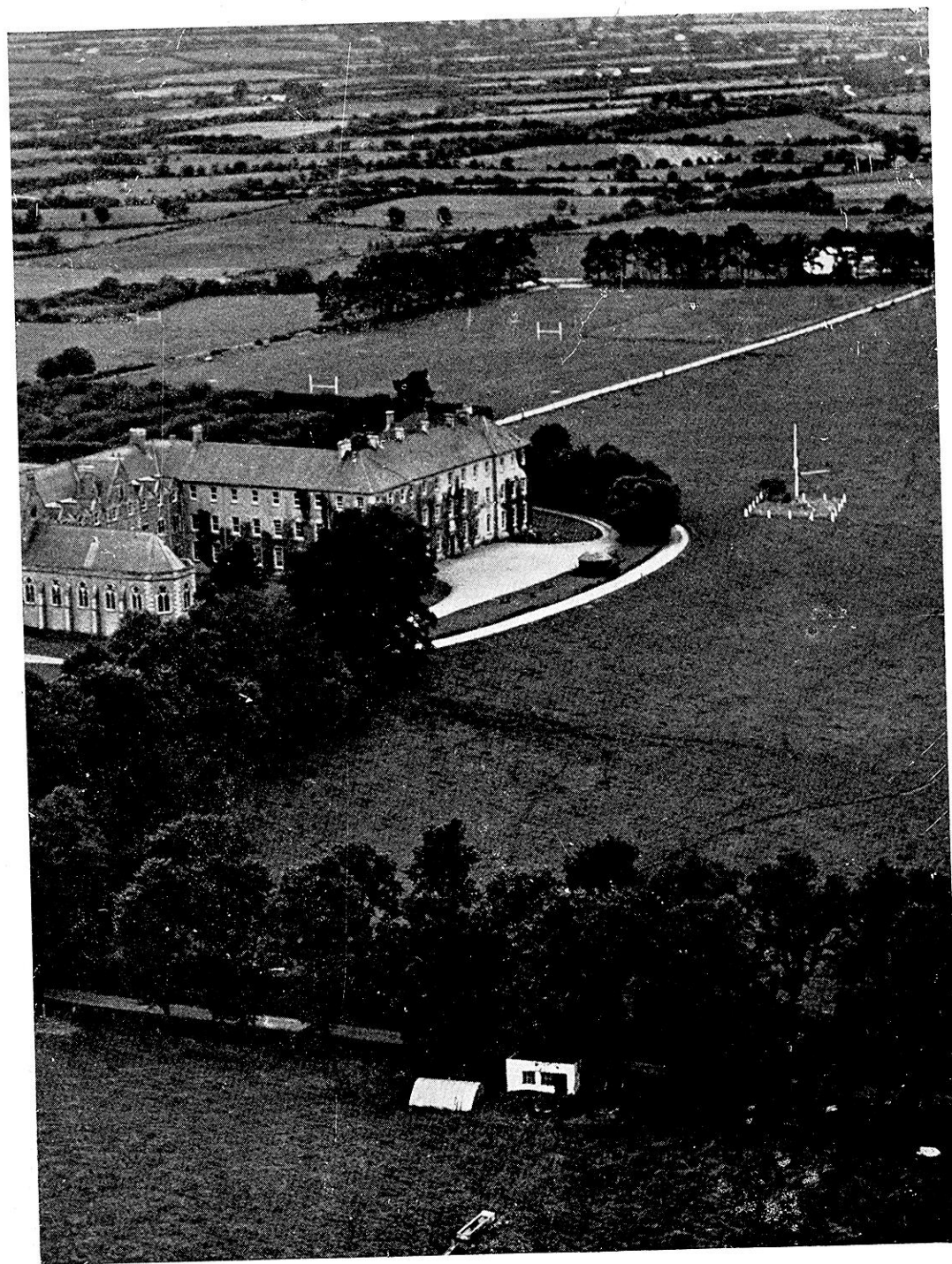

Life after class does not consist entirely of what somebody has termed "organised, outdoor, active, recreational physical exercise". In our college the social and cultural aspects of education have not been neglected. Passing over in a word such "time-fillers" as billiards, table-tennis, darts, chess and more vigorous indoor exercises like basketball and the Bruff dance—the preparations were often more active than rugby practice!—the main contribution to the life of the college from the "pavilion members" was the production of a large number of plays—*et alia*—in the past few years. The revival (and the word is well used, for as far back as the first *Mungret Annual* in 1897 there has been great interest and work in this line of country) of drama in Mungret dates from 1970 when Mr. Derek Cassidy, S.J. (himself a "pavilion member!") opened with J. B. Keane's *The Year of the Hiker*. This performance was more than well received and in the term leading up to Easter the Leaving Certificate class of 1971, having J. M. Synge's *The Playboy of the Western World* on their examination list were enticed into a staging of the play. Together these two plays showed that Mungret was capable of a high standard of production and acting and also that boys not endowed athletically might easily display real talent in other fields. Sean McDonnell as "The Hiker" and Jack Normoyle in the "Playboy" were somewhat unexpected successes, while Michael Croome-Carroll in "The Hiker" began a tradition of gorgeous "girls" on the Mungret stage.

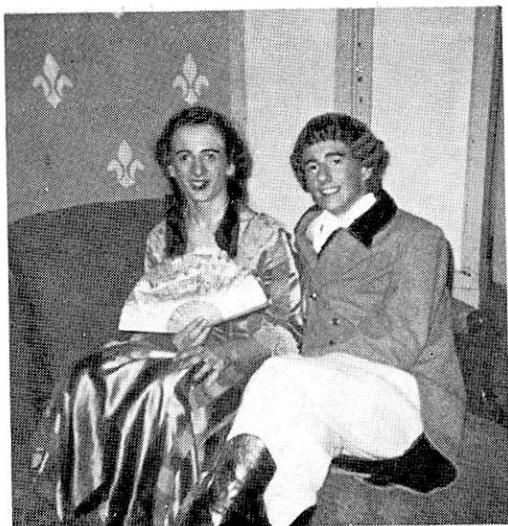
Encouraged (and ever encouraging!) by these successes, Fr. Peter Coghlan, S.J. (as First Prefect), an enthusiastic, expert and experienced producer, became even more ambitious and Christmas 1971 witnessed Robert Bolt's *A Man for All Seasons*. A fine set made by Noel Ruigrok, who had created excellent sets for the previous year's performances also, and brilliantly lit by David Hardiman, together with splendid costumes

from Bourke's in Dublin (who did all our subsequent plays), set off a quite gifted cast, many of whom were a revelation. James O'Connor as the "Common Man" gave the performance of a lifetime; John Lynch was magnificent as "Sir Thomas More"; Michael Henchoz superbly villainous as "Cromwell", while the smaller parts were played splendidly by Colm Lincoln, Paul Kerrigan, David Hardiman, John Redmond, Ricky Duffy and Frank Ryan. Brian Carroll was gorgeous and effective as Lady Margaret, and Charlie McCarthy most moving as Lady Alice. Ted Sheehy carried the difficult part of Rich extremely well.

At the beginning of the next year we decided to do three plays—Fr. Coghlan was now relieved of First Prefect duties—and the fact that nearly all the "stars" of "Seasons" were still available made the choice of quality plays possible. In October 1972 we put on the Leaving Certificate play *The Importance of Being Earnest* by Oscar Wilde.

Outstanding performances in this production were given by David Hardiman (Jack), Ted Sheehy (Algy), Charlie McCarthy (Lady Bracknell), while the elegant young ladies were devastatingly portrayed by Brian Carroll (Gwendolen), Jerry O'Connor (Cecily), and Colm Lincoln (Miss Prism); and John Redmond as the "Canon" was just perfect. In fact we took a lot of pride in our production which seemed to us to be quite superior to a professional one we saw later in the city theatre—bias, perhaps!

Our second play of this school year was Richard Brinsley Sheridan's *The School for Scandal*, by far the most ambitious to that date. After a first night, which failed to grip the school audience, the second performance for parents brought out both the bite and the humour of Sheridan very successfully. This play marked both the end of some careers on our stage and the beginning of the rise of new stars in the Mungret Dramsoc. Dominating the performance was John Lynch as Sir Peter Teazle—elegant, irritable, foolish and at the same time touchingly above the petty sniping. James O'Connor was just splendid as Sir Oliver, as was Charlie McCarthy as Joseph and Colm Lincoln was as "waspy" as Crabtree should be,

with Ted Sheehy superb as Lady Sneerwell. All these "stars" were familiar from other years; but there were also some newcomers. Of these mention must be made of Kieran Rumley (Mrs. Candour), Brian Lynch (Charles), David Lombard (Moses), with the new female hits Frank Whelan (Lady Teazle), and Paul McMahon (Maria) all of whom made what can only be called lasting impressions.

Continuing in a comic vein, we did Joseph Kesselring's *Arsenic and Old Lace*. Kieran Rumley literally brought the house down as Aunt Aggie, and was ably abetted by Paul McMahon as Martha. Brian Lynch was suitably confused as Mortimer and kept sane only by Frank Whelan as Elaine. Paul Heaney was horrifying as Jonathan, David Lombard brilliant as Einstein, and Stephen O'Sullivan was a convincing O'Hara. The best laughs of the evening were earned by John Lynes as Teddy—the trumpet blasts were ear-splitting!

With only two classes in the college, the choice was restricted this year, 1973-74. However, some people acclaimed Brian Friel's *Philadelphia, Here I Come* as the best production of recent years. Kieran Rumley and Frank Whelan as Gar "Public"

and "Private", respectively, were really quite superb. Noel Maloney as the father and Paul McMahon as the housekeeper were extremely convincing in their characterisations. Brian Lynch as Lizzie Sweeney, ably supported by John de Maye and David Smith were suitably brash as the American cousins. Peter Morgan, Brian Ahern and Paul Gannon made a boisterous group of "The Lads", while Stephen O'Sullivan gave a fine cameo as the arid Canon Mick O'Byrne. Other parts were capably performed by Declan Gannon (Doogan), Jimmy McNamara as a beautiful Kate, and Gerry Reidy was an excellent portrayal of the country schoolmaster Boyle.

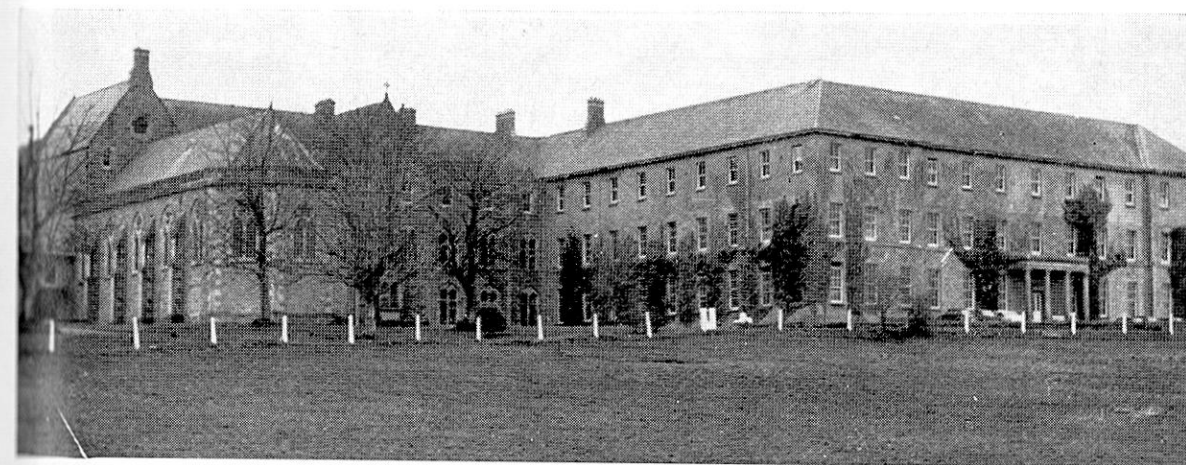
We were exceptionally fortunate for the last three plays in discovering a set designer of imagination and genius in Pady O'Reilly—backed up by John Gilboy, Richard Bourke and Martin Buckley—whose work was such an inspiration to the cast that at one dress-rehearsal it was agreed that in spite of the defects of the cast the play was worth doing for the set alone.

While in the process of mentioning the personnel of the backstage, there is one who

cannot be omitted. Those of our readers who know of these things will have some idea of the work that has to be done to make a boy into a widow, into a grandfather, into all characters of differing ages, etc. In the area of make-up, then, there is one person who has been of invaluable assistance—the college nurse, Nurse Battell. She has had to cast an eye over many a "female" to check the hair style, secure the wigs, check the lipstick, and all those other things that would have to go by the wayside without her careful attention. She has, undoubtedly, been the woman behind many a man (and "woman") on our stage. We are sincerely indebted to her and we wish to express our deep appreciation for all her kindness.

To come to the end. The Mungret Dramsoc provided a useful recreation and some dramatic experience for quite a few boys—the college photo of the active members of the Dramsoc in 1973 totalled almost forty people. We hope that they will continue to tread the boards in university and in productions round the country in the future.

Scouting in Mungret 1970-72

The aims of the Scouting movement might be summed up briefly as follows: to cultivate a spirit of comradeship and a spirit of both individual and collective responsibility among young people, and to provide for them a training—in the most liberal sense of the word—in fields both recreational and educational. In the sometimes limiting and sometimes advantageous environment of a boarding school, the 20th Limerick Unit succeeded superlatively in forwarding these aims. In our short existence (just a mere two years) we achieved quite an amount.

When Br. Joe Ward, S.J., came to Mungret in September 1970 as Third Club Prefect, he made known to us his interest in Scouting. Several of us also showed interest and discussions on the possibility of forming a troop turned into troop meetings. It was about mid-October when the troop was officially formed with an original membership of about eight. Immediately we set about completing the "Rawley" tests, and by Christmas several were well on the way to the completion of the Second Class Tests. During the first term of the troop's existence a number of service projects were undertaken, including an investigation of fire security in the college itself.

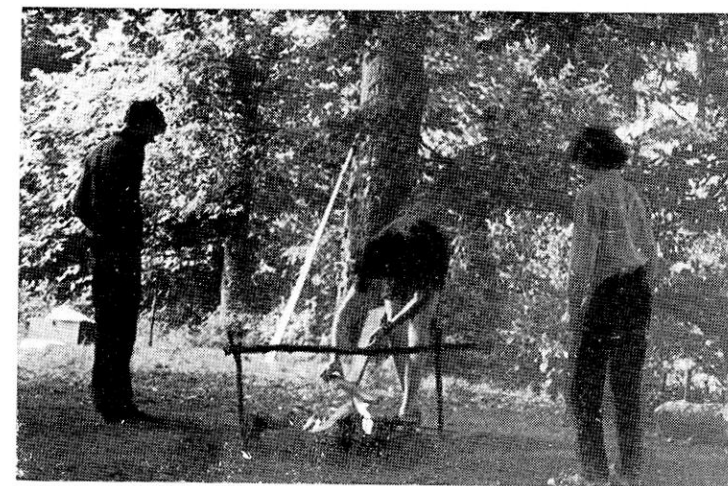
After Christmas we began to concentrate more on outdoor activities. We did several pioneering, first-aid and mapping projects, under the expert direction of Br. Ward. We also enjoyed many "campfires" down by "The Lake". During April we had our first investiture, and just before Easter (1971) two of the P.L.s and one of the A.P.L.s went on a P.L.s training course in Limerick. After

Easter we moved our "den" from the "Aps Hut" to the room under the stage, which was better suited to our fast-expanding troop. At this time we were preparing for our first annual camp, which was to be held in Downe—a village in Kent, near Biggin Hill of world war two fame. Thirteen of the troop of twenty-five went on this camp. We camped with Scouts of the Sacred Heart Unit, Donnybrook, Dublin, in which Br. Ward had formerly been a Scoutmaster. This was a great advantage to us as it was our first camp and so to be with other Scouts we knew was very beneficial. We paid two visits to London and saw many of the "sights". We paid a visit to Biggin Hill Airfield, and there we saw the beautiful R.A.F. memorial chapel. We had several hikes, one of which was along the Pilgrims' Way, the main road for pilgrims from London to Canterbury during medieval times. It was indeed a very enjoyable and successful camp. Our inexperience was compensated for by Br. Ward's expertise and the help rendered by the Donnybrook Scouts. Sincere thanks to all.

At the beginning of the new school year we were well and truly a Scout Troop, having the experience of a camp behind us. Officers in the troop at the beginning of this year were: S.M., Br. Joe Ward, S.J.; Chaplain, Fr. Peter M. Coghlan, S.J.; T.L., Jim Foley; and P.L.s, David Smith, Dermot Clohessy and Stephen O'Sullivan. There were six or seven "Rookies" who joined up in September, and they were equally distributed among the three patrols. Our patrol-names were very original indeed: "Cobra", "Pirhana" and "Marmot", all a far cry from

the traditional "Lion", "Tiger", etc. The three Patrol Leaders and the Troop Leader had completed their First Class Tests by the end of September and were planning on attaining the level of Star Scout by the following Easter. Our test system was quite a departure from the traditional "everything off by heart" method. A basic knowledge of the more important facets of a subject was required along with a willingness to expound one's knowledge of the subject. It was quite an achievement that in the two years of its existence more than a hundred merit badges, three star badges and five first class badges were awarded to the troop. Br. Ward also did the greater part of his Wood Badge course in those two years. Such an achievement is a credit both to the troop and to Br. Ward's patient and expert instruction.

After Christmas our "Venturer" section was formed. The existing P.L.s and the T.L.

became members of this section and A.P.L.s Brian Ruigrok, Peter O'Loughlin and Joe Burke were all promoted to P.L.s. The chief aims of the Venturers were to assist Br. Ward in the running of the troop, and to concentrate on becoming Star Scouts by Easter. Dermot Clohessy, David Smith and Stephen O'Sullivan all fulfilled the requirements for this level of proficiency about one month before Easter. A few weeks before Easter we made a trip to Dublin where we visited Christ Church and St. Patrick's Cathedrals, the Four Courts, and other interesting places.

The Summer term of 1972 was spent in preparation for our second annual camp. Checking our equipment, making out camp programmes and arranging our transport proved quite a task. Our camp was on Innis Mor, the largest of the three Aran Islands. It was arranged for ten days—June 26 to

July 6. We were to fly to Innis Mor from Shannon on the morning of June 26. When we arrived in Shannon we were informed that the plane was being repaired and would not fly until the next morning. We returned to Mungret, somewhat dispirited; but the following day everything went off without a hitch. Our camp in Aran was indeed a memorable one. We visited all the historic places of the island, including Dun Aengus and the Glassen Rocks. Incidents, such as having Desie Stephenson "paged" over the public address system at Shannon, and Brian Ruigrok's "contacts" among the locals, gave a humorous note to the proceedings. On our return from Innis Mor a number of us returned to Mungret for a week, to supervise a holiday for fifty-two boys from East Belfast, aged between six and eleven years. These young Northerners were, to put it

mildly, rather lively. Under the direction of Fr. Frewen (Minister in Mungret) and Br. Ward we gave them a most enjoyable week which included a trip to Kilkee.

Sadly, in September 1972 Br. Ward departed for Clongowes, and unfortunately without his leadership and direction the troop could not go on. In early October we made our last official appearance as a Scout Troop, when we put on a display of our chaplain's electric train layout at a diocesan arts and crafts exhibition. At this exhibition we received our Good Camping Certificate for our Innis Mor camp. It was sad to see the end of the troop which had contributed so much to the school. But, as the good book says: "The Lord gave, and the Lord hath taken away. Blessed be the name of the Lord."

Mungret P.P.U.

The Mungret College Union came into being as a result of an advertisement in the daily papers in October 1950. At a large gathering in the Shelbourne Hotel about this time it was decided to form a Past Pupils Union. This meeting was chaired by P. J. Raftery, and the first election of officers took place on 28 November 1950.

The officers then elected were: Chairman, P. J. Raftery; Vice-Chairman, Michael O'Dwyer, B.L.; Secretary, Rory O'Connor; Treasurer, P. J. Nutley. The members of the Council consisted of the officers, together with Mr. S. Brady, T.D., Mr. T. Gough, Mr. M. Maguire, Mr. M. Hargroves, Supt. P. Murphy, Mr. J. O'Leary and Very Rev. Fr. Jack O'Connell, P.P., who was appointed Chaplain of the Union.

Over the next four years or so, several meetings were called at which the officers and Council members devoted a great deal of time and energy to the drawing up of the rules of the Union, and it was as a result of the effort put in during this period that the future success of the Union was possible.

The first annual general meeting took place in Jury's Hotel on 10 December 1956 under the Chairmanship of Mr. P. J. Raftery and an election of officers took place. At this election Mr. P. J. Murphy was elected President of the Union, and Rory O'Connor was elected Secretary, while Mr. Patrick J. Nutley was elected Treasurer—which post he had in fact held from the beginning. Since that time, the Union has gone from strength to strength. Over the years our numbers grew and new faces emerged in the official capacities, many of whom are still with the Union. Regretfully, but naturally, many of the original members (the founding fathers) are no longer with us, but have passed on to their reward.

Of the original founder members of the Union, we still have Mark Maguire, J. O'Leary and P. J. Nutley (who served as Treasurer of the Union from 1950 to 1963, and who is now the only original officer of

the Union still a member of the Council—indeed an indication of his dedication).

Some slight mention was made above of the dedication of Paddy Nutley; each of the officers, as well as the Council members, could with all justification claim the same mention. May we just say that their efforts, usually hard and tedious, will always be appreciated. There is one other individual who merits explicit mention, and that is Fr. Paddy Coffey, S.J., whose wholehearted devotion and loyalty to the Union, and to all things "Mungret", could never have justice done them by mere words. But yet, what other way have we of saying "a thousand thanks"? To you, Fr. Coffey, we are deeply grateful.

As a final word we would like you to know, and ask you to spread the "good news" that the Union will continue to function in the future, as long as there are Mungret men around. As a measure to ensure its success in the future, it is intended to instal the President of the Union at the annual Union function, to be held in Dublin in November of each year. But the President cannot guarantee the success of the Union all on his own; nor can he be a President of himself! So let it be announced from the rooftops that members are still more than welcome, and we ask you, and exhort you, and encourage you to join the ranks.

We cannot close our notes on the Union



without making some mention of the great occasion organised by the Southern Branch of the Union last January. Those of our readers who read the *Limerick Leader* will have come across an article written by Mr. Charlie Mulqueen on January 19 last. The occasion was a gala closure ball, held in the college on Saturday, January 12. It was a remarkable endeavour, and the amount of work that had to go into the preparation was monumental.

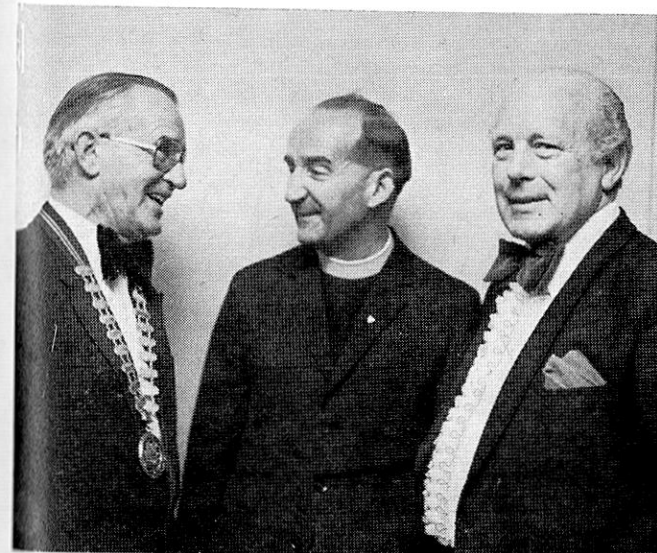
But it paid off. Not only was the crowd big, it was huge—400 approximately. Everything about the night was just great; the big number, the great music and the superb

“At the ‘final’ dinner for past students held in the college on 20 April 1974 the evening commenced with Mass concelebrated by about twenty priests, past pupils of Mun-

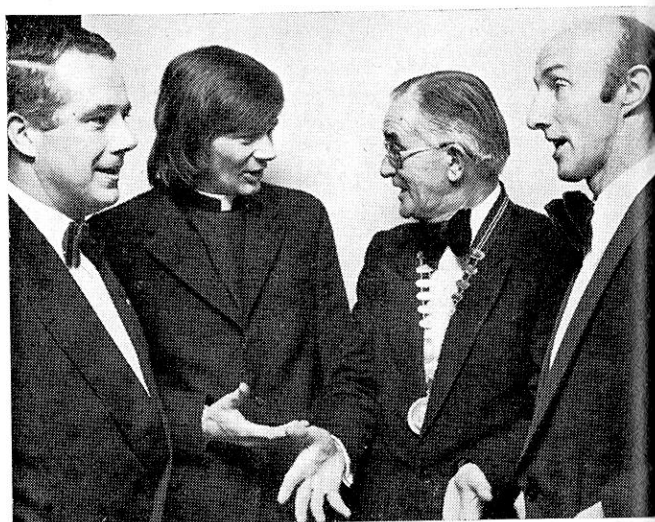
gret and some members of the Society of Jesus connected with the college over the years. The concelebrated Mass, and the special 'bidding' prayers for the present, the past (living and dead), their parents and Mungret priests throughout the world were most impressive and touching; Fr. Rector's spiritual homily was also something to be remembered.

"Quite apart from the moving solemnity of the Mass, the occasion was marked by something most unusual which can never be repeated. Assisting the priests were two deacons—past pupils of Mungret—who are to be ordained to the priesthood in June 1974: Rev. E. C. Bourke (1919-23), diocese of Ossory, and Rev. Derek Cassidy, S.J. "On behalf of Mungret men everywhere we extend to Ned and Derek our sincere good wishes for many years of fruitful work in the priesthood, and in doing so, we feel sure that they must take some little pride in the knowledge that, in June 1974, they will be adding to the one thousand priests which Mungret has given to God and the Church down the years of its existence."

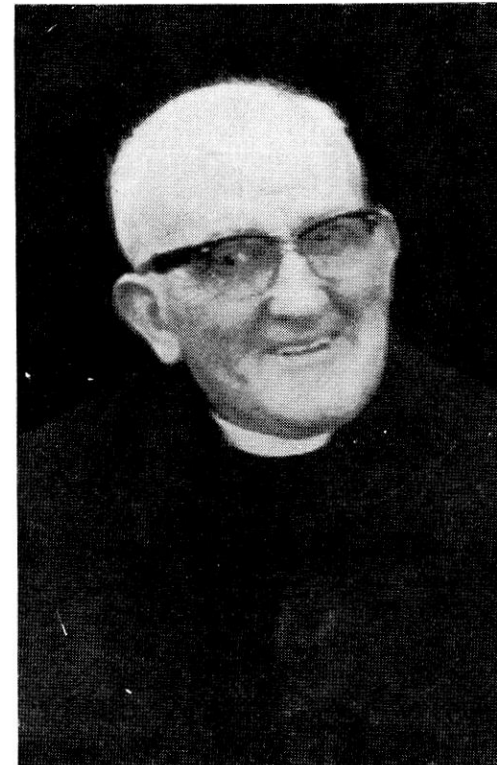

Obituaries



Br. Thomas Murphy, S.J. (1894-1968)

When I arrived in Mungret in 1952 little did I dream that I would spend fifteen contented years in that house with a tradition and a happy community atmosphere which was rather unique. Mungret's situation outside the city of Limerick and its two-schools-in-one contributed largely to creating its homely atmosphere; but then, people are essential in making a house a home.

We, the Brothers of the Jesuit community, were a happy group, and I soon came to see how much we owed to Br. Tom Murphy, for his example was always an inspiration to us. Externally, Br. Tom did not have a lot going for him; but one could not live side by side with him for long without perceiving what I might call his inner goodness and devotion. To my mind he was a perfect

example of the "Traditional" Jesuit Brother—deeply spiritual and devoted to his work. In all weathers Br. Tom could be seen making his twice daily trek across the fields to the pump-house to ensure that the college would have water; and, prior to the E.S.B. installation, he was in charge of the generator which gave us light. Indeed, all of the house maintenance depended on Br. Murphy and he never spared himself in time or energy when there was a job to be done.

I soon came to see how Br. Tom's life centered round his morning meditation and the Mass, to which he was devoted. He loved serving Mass and it was from this, I feel sure, that he derived his great reverence for the priesthood, which one could not fail to notice. This may explain, at least in part, his love of the apostolic school. He took a fatherly interest in all the apostolic students and championed their needs and interests at all times. It was both touching and amusing to see him gathering the left-over dessert from the community dinner to supplement the "aps" second-table!

One always found it difficult to refuse him any request as it was never for himself he asked anything, but to fulfil the need of somebody else. For instance, when I would be very rushed in the kitchen he had a habit of coming along and announcing "There's a poor man at the back door." Of course, I could never refuse that sly, charming smile and would end up producing something.

Br. Tom possessed a dry, witty, Dublin humour, which could be devastating at times and helped to make all our recreations enjoyable. On feastdays, and at other times, he loved to join in a game of "one hundred and ten", and it was delightful to see how he enjoyed winning a game, which he usually contrived by remarking: "Let tr-r-icks come this way." Towards the end of his life, he developed a bad tremor in his hands and so, at Christmas time, I was roped in to write his Christmas correspondence (again, how could I refuse?). Letters went to bishops and

priests all over the world who were past apostolic students and who always sent him cards at this time of year. Indeed, when any of these dignitaries or simple priests paid a visit to Mungret, the first person they asked to see was Br. Murphy. His pleasures were of the simplest kind, and he loved an "outing"—rare enough in Mungret! Mr. Jack O'Brien (R.I.P.) on occasion, took Br. Tom and myself out for a day's tour of the south-west, and my enjoyment of these trips was always enriched by Tom's Dublin wit.

Looking back, the things I most remember about Br. Tom are his wholehearted, generous devotion to work, in the execution of which he never spared himself; his love for the Mass and the Rosary; his fidelity to his spiritual duties; his loyalty to Mungret College, especially the apostolic school, and his unfailing cheerfulness.

Br. Tom died on 2 October 1968. I had left Mungret by then, but I came to his funeral, and was very impressed—though not surprised—by the tributes paid to him. At the Requiem Mass, Fr. Rector (Fr. Jack Kerr) said that although it was not usual he felt that he should say a few words about Br. Murphy to the boys and the large attendance, and proceeded to deliver a very touching homily on Br. Tom's life as a Jesuit.

As was fitting, he died and is buried in the community plot in the grounds of the college he loved so well. What a pity the college should soon be no more; but, for me, whenever I think of the past, Mungret and Br. Tom Murphy will be intertwined memories which I shall always cherish.

Well done, good and faithful servant.
Enter thou into the joy of the Lord.

Br. Tom has already heard these words from our dear Lord, and I count on his help that I too may hear the same words when I go to join my brother in Christ.

Fr. John A. Deevy, S.J. (1887-1969)

John Aloysius Deevy was born in Waterford on 15 June 1887. He belonged to a much-respected Waterford family of four boys and nine girls. His family is perhaps best known because of its accountancy firm which has offices in several Irish cities but it also has to its credit a well-known playwright, his sister Teresa, many of whose plays were presented successfully at the Abbey Theatre in Dublin and abroad.

John was a layboy at Mungret from 1903 to 1906 when he entered the Jesuit novitiate at Tullabeg. He studied philosophy at Civildale in Italy for three years and then taught in Belvedere, Mungret and Clongowes. He was ordained at Milltown Park on 15 August 1920 at the end of his second year of theology. This was a special privilege granted to those who, because of the European war, were kept longer than usual as scholastics in the colleges. It did not, however, dispense them from completing the full four years of theology. After his tertianship, which he did at Tullabeg, he resumed teaching and made the acquaintance of the Crescent.

After a few years he was selected for administrative work and he continued in it until the last few years of his life. The Jesuit novitiate had been changed to Emo Park in 1930 and two years later Fr. Deevy was sent there as bursar. He then became superior and finally, when the new house reached its full status, he was appointed rector. In all he spent twelve years at Emo where his chief interest was in developing the farm and in doing pastoral supply work in the neighbouring parishes. He had a car at his disposal and it soon became known that he could be relied upon to come to the assistance of priests and convents who needed help, and that he made demands on no one. In time he won a host of clerical friends and he warmly responded to friendship shown him.

In 1944 his period as rector at Emo was completed and he was transferred to Tullabeg to become bursar and to take charge of the farm. Nine years later, in 1953, he was sent to take over the farm at Mungret. In

1956 he celebrated his golden jubilee as a Jesuit but he continued to look after the farm until he was in his seventies. When he was relieved of this responsibility he devoted his time and energy to the compilation of the "Mungret Record". This is a list of all past students with their places of origin and their years in the college. It involved working through all sorts of documents and when lists were completed he had to type them out page by page. It was a very big undertaking but it was a labour of love and he was happy to be able to complete it for distribution in 1963. It is, of course, an invaluable contribution to the history of the college.

Fr. Deevy died on 10 March 1969. Up to the time of his final illness he missed his daily Mass only twice in his life of forty-nine years as a priest. He was a man of quite outstanding uprightness and integrity, of great kindness of heart and he contributed much to every community in which he lived.

Fr. Michael Murphy, S.J. (1894-1971)

Michael Murphy was born in Monaghan on 1 April 1894 and received his secondary education at the diocesan seminary. He then went to Dublin to study engineering in the recently-opened U.C.D., cycling from Monaghan at the beginning of each week and back home again for the weekends. Before completing his course at U.C.D. he entered the novitiate of the Society of Jesus at Tullabeg. That was in 1914. He remained in Tullabeg after his first vows in 1916, and in 1917 sat his final university examination. He studied philosophy at Stoneyhurst in England and Milltown Park in Dublin. He was a scholastic in Clongowes from 1920 to 1923, returning that year to Milltown for theology.

His first connection with Mungret was in 1927 when he came as prefect of studies, which post he held until 1935. It is in this capacity (which he held also from the late 1940s until 1954) that he will be best remembered by Mungret past pupils. His little "black book" was the terror of all. It was the one thing he used to get the work done! Boys under him would do anything rather

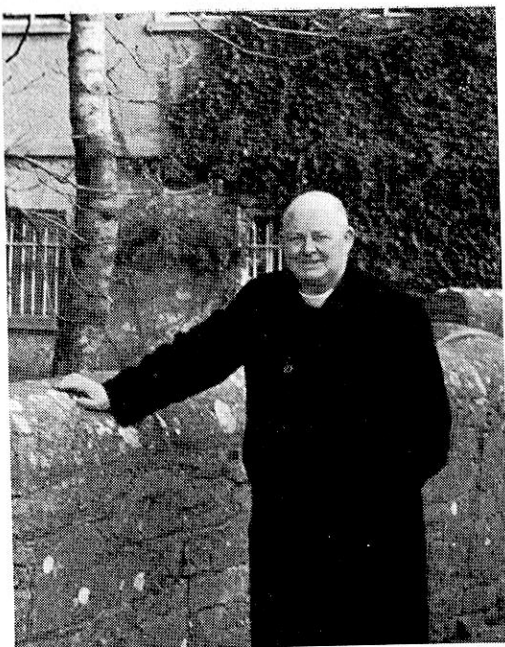
than have their names entered in that dreaded book. As one Jesuit teacher remarked: "Fr. Murphy would come into a 'rowdy' class and stand in front of it. While not looking at any particular individual, he was looking straight into each one—one could see all the past 'sins' of each boy coming up before the eyes of the offender. Then he would just walk out again."

Fr. Michael's greatest interest in the things of this world was undoubtedly in the area of mathematics. He taught maths in the colleges—whenever he got the chance!—and even after his teaching days, he continued his interest. He was a really enthusiastic teacher, and almost necessarily was thus a very good one.

In 1956 he moved to St Mary's, Emo, then the Jesuit novitiate. Here he had the onerous task of procurator, where his mathematical interests were somewhat concretised. He remained in St Mary's until it was closed down in 1968, when he returned to Mungret. He was now an elderly man, and was suffering quite some discomfort from a skin disease. For two further years he soldiered on, and towards the end of his life he experienced great difficulty in climbing stairways. Indeed, it was on the stairs in Mungret that early in 1970 he suffered a rather bad fall, and this accident was the beginning of the illness which ended his life in July 1971.

Only as recently as 1965 did the writer first meet Fr. Michael Murphy. That was in St Mary's, Emo. For one further year, 1970-71, we both lived in Mungret. The man I knew was a very kind and considerate man; a man of obvious deep spirituality; a man who suffered in silence, without wearing that martyred expression. He was a man who was interested in others—the one question always on his lips being a simple, concerned, "Doing well?" Fr. Michael's quiet presence, despite his own personal suffering, was both an influence on the writer and an inspiration to him to endeavour to live out his Jesuit life in the same quiet, concerned, spiritual manner.

Mungret, where Fr. Murphy laboured for the Lord, is soon to be very quiet: in that peace and serenity may Fr. Michael enjoy the vision and peace of his Lord and Master.



Fr. William B. Merritt, S.J. (1914-73)

Fr. Willie was a Limerickman. He was born in Limerick and he is buried in Mungret. He was the eldest of three children, all boys and all three completed their school-days at Mungret College. In his younger years three influences played a part in his vocation to the Society of Jesus, family life, his participation as an altarboy in St. John's Cathedral and his training in self-discipline and habits of study begun under the direction of the Christian Brothers. Mungret and later the Society of Jesus reaped where others had sown.

He entered the Society of Jesus in September 1932 and after two years novitiate, where he is still affectionately remembered as an enthusiastic "outdoor works" man he spent four years in Rathfarnham where he attended lectures in U.C.D. After finishing his course in U.C.D. he left for France in September 1938 with a B.A. and an honours M.A. under his already ample belt. His philosophical studies in Vals were cut short by world war two and he finished his philosophy

at St Stanislaus College, Tullamore. He then went on to teach with success at Belvedere and at that time trained some of the best junior cup teams of those years. His interest in and enthusiasm for rugby and soccer remained with him all his life; the fortunes or misfortunes of Limerick A.F.C. were clearly read on his Monday morning face—for he was the most honest and transparent of men, totally unlike the caricature of the wily Jesuit of fiction!

His ordination to the priesthood in July 1946 brought out in him that more serious side of his character which impelled him to seek "perfection" in all things. He could never be satisfied with "second-rate" work of any kind in himself or in others. He gave the next ten years of his life to the missions, working as a teacher in our college in Hong Kong. His history notes—which were clear, succinct and easily learned were published there in book form. Teachers also profited from them and a reputation for good history teaching often rested on the envied possession of Bill's notes!

Without his realising it, he made very great demands on himself. Eventually the strain of his work and the pressures of the political situation in Hong Kong undermined his health. He returned to Ireland in the early 1950s far from well. He never fully recovered his health from that time. Despite that, he held various posts in the Order, in St. Francis Xavier's, Gardiner Street, the Provincial's Residence, and the College of Industrial Relations, before he finally returned to Mungret College in 1967. Like the Master, whom he sought to follow, he did all things well and as a bonus was a good "community man" to boot! Serious by nature with a deep sense of responsibility which sometimes weighed upon him, he achieved a balance by his sense of humour, his deep faith and unostentatious acts of piety (he was a regular visitor to Our Lady's Shrine at Knock) and his interest in people and in sport. He loved Mungret and there is no denying that the decision to close his old school saddened his last years. May his generous soul rest in peace.

Fr. Eamonn Egan, S.J. (1923-73)

Fr. Eamonn Egan, who died so tragically in New York harbour last Summer, was a man, to put it simply, that it is good to remember. Most writers of obituaries face the dilemma of trying to tell the truth and yet be kind to the one who has passed away. But with Eamonn Egan no such problem arises. For he was a very unusual man, possessing two qualities that rarely go together, an ice-clear mind and a tender heart. People admired his mind, so quick to see a problem, utterly fair in argument, always seeking the truth, but they loved the heart, so sensitive to the feelings of others, and identifying totally with them, especially in times of trial.

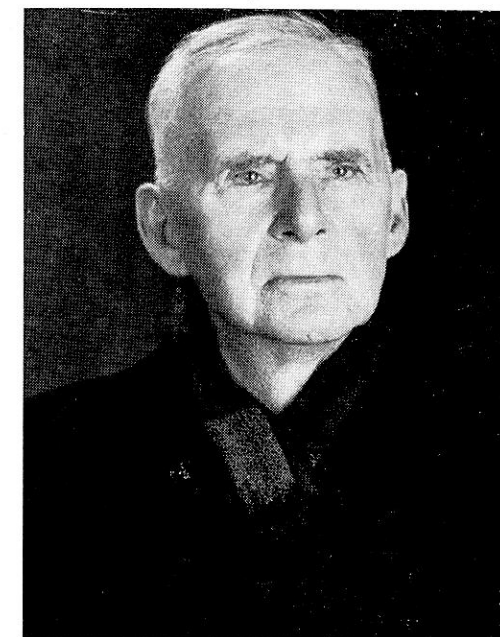
It was his power of clear thinking, articulated so fluently, that made him a great teacher of philosophy both at Mungret and Milltown Park. He was the centre of the philosophy school in Mungret during the early 1960s and he won the unlimited admiration of the philosophers, not all of whom would have been satisfied with anything less than the best. I remember him often saying that the standard there was higher than at the Jesuit philosophy school in Tullabeg, where he had been a professor until its closure. It was never clear to me whether this remark was intended as a compliment to Mungret or a slight to Tullabeg! It is only fair to add that Eamonn never felt quite at home, teaching in the secondary school division of Mungret. He was a man destined for success, amongst minds more mature than is normal, or perhaps desirable, in the schoolboy world.

I once went on holiday with him, when we were both in Mungret. It was in one of those modest seaside boarding houses that flourished and indeed still flourish, in the west of Ireland. The hostess never advertised, but the same families, very pleasant, but by no means unsophisticated, came there every year. In a matter of days, Eamonn was the most popular man in the house. This was, in part, due to his much admired talent for painting, but above all to his charm of manner, which was the outward expression of his natural feeling for people. He was so

lacking in conceit, that when I pointed out his social success, he seemed both astonished and annoyed.

Those Mungret men now working as priests all over the world who had the privilege to be his students, will, I know, never forget him. I am certain that they are united in sympathy with his relatives and countless friends in Ireland, who still mourn such a tragic loss. May he rest in peace.

John Bithrey (1877-1973)

John Bithrey, when he died at the age of ninety-six, must have been easily the senior member of the past pupils of Mungret. His family history is interesting. His grandfather, a merchant of Kinsale, ruined by the famine, emigrated to Australia, and built up a prosperous business. His daughter, deciding to return to Ireland, met on the ship the first officer, an Englishman of French descent, who later became her husband and settled in Kinsale. John, the only son of the family, came to Mungret in 1889. All his life he had

the happiest memories of his schooldays. A few years ago, a letter appeared in *The Irish Times* criticising the religious teachers. John replied with a very moving tribute to his former masters in Mungret.

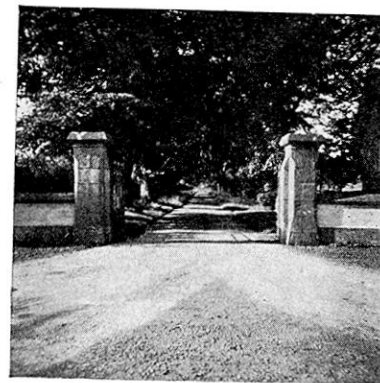
In 1893 he entered the Society of Jesus and did a brilliant course of studies, taking his M.A. in Classics in the Royal University. He studied philosophy with the German Jesuits in Holland, and in 1903 went to Australia, where he taught for five years at Xavier College, Melbourne. On his return to Ireland in 1908, he was found to be in delicate health, and was advised not to continue in the religious life. Almost immediately he obtained a teaching position at Mount St. Benedict's, Gorey, and, after a few years, was appointed inspector of secondary schools, one of the commissioners who interviewed him being the redoubtable Dr. Mahaffy.

John Bithrey was never a conventional inspector, and the originality of his views and methods not infrequently caused a flutter in the staid dovescotes of the Department of Education. But in the schools all

over Ireland his attractive personality made him a welcome visitor, and his love of learning for its own sake was a constant source of inspiration.

He was a man of rare culture, a classical scholar of the first rank, well read in English and French literature, an excellent pianist and a good mathematician. Every year he used procure the Honours Leaving Certificate examination papers in mathematics, and work through them for his own satisfaction. In his retirement, his favourite occupation was the reading of the Latin and Greek authors with which he was so familiar. Many instances could be given of his intellectual powers, but one must suffice. When he was over ninety, the writer had a discussion with him as to the value of the writing of Latin and Greek verse, which was formerly part of the curriculum. A few days later, John produced a really beautiful version of *She is far from the Land* in Latin elegiacs. It is well that we have the memory of men like John Bithrey to remind us of a culture which is fast becoming rare in our hurrying world.

As we go to press, the sad news of the death of Nurse Loreto Battell has reached us. Her memory will long be held dear in the hearts of all who knew her. May she rest in peace.

28—Juniors in top form ... Clanwilliam no opposition for them. Seniors beat *Spirid Naomh* 35-3.

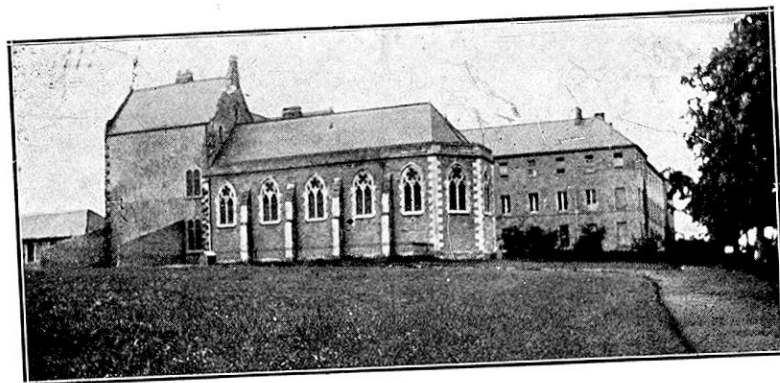

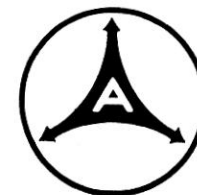

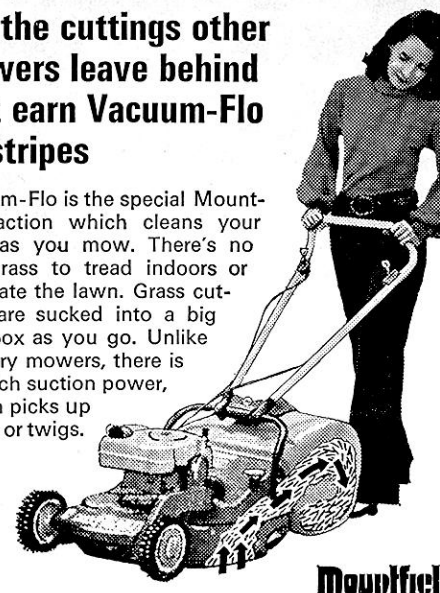
